Held at the Institution on Thursday, 23rd January, 1862.

The Advertisement calling the Meeting having been read, the Secretary read the Report of the Committee of Management for 1861, and the Financial Statement of the Treasurer, and the following Resolutions were unanimously agreed to:---

TENTH ANNUAL REPORT,

IN accordance with the rules, the Committee now present their Report for 1861; and in doing so, they desire to express their thankfulness to Almighty God for the success which, in his good providence, has attended the operations of the Institution during the year.

A full Return of the Vital Statistics of the Institution, together with the Financial Statement, is appended; but it may be well to mention here some of the leading particulars, which are as follow :-- On the 31st December, 1860, 95 inmates remained in the Institution-64 in the Infirmary, and 31 in the Benevolent Asy-During 1861, 687 were admitted to the Infirmary, and 37 lum. to the Benevolent Asylum; making 819 who have been inmates of the Institution during the year, being an increase of 127 over the previous year: of this number, 660 have been discharged cured or greatly relieved; 65 died; and 94 remained on 31st December, 1861, (60 in the Infirmary, and 34 in the Benevolent Asylum). 1632 Out-patients have also been admitted, an increase of 902 over the number in the previous year. 2450 persons have thus received the benefits of the Institution in 1861. The daily average number of Patients in the house has been 109, and the daily average atten-The number of Patients now in the dance of Out-patients 52. house, January 23rd, is 133.

It is gratifying that though a greater number of Patients have been admitted, the mortality has been much less than in the previous year, which was also favorable in this respect, and this notwithstanding the usual number of accidents known to be fatal, and of cases in a moribund condition have been admitted.

The prevailing diseases have been—Chronic Rheumatism, 79; Consumption, 31; Bronchitis, 23; Disease of Heart, 13; Cancer, 16; Ulcer, 34; Abscess, 22; Debility, 27; Stricture, 25; &c. And 34 Cases of Fracture; 25 of Wounds; and 25 of Contusions, were admitted.

As in former years the list of Patients embraces persons of different creeds and countries. It contains 286 of the Church of England; 244 Roman Oatholic; 76 Fresbyterian; 35 Wesleyan; 8 Independent; 7 Baptist; 1 Quaker; 26 Lutherans; 4 Calvinists; 3 Jews; 1 Bible Christian; 3 Mahomedans. Others professing no religion.

The receipts from all sources were $\pounds 7164$ 5s.; and the disbursements $\pounds 5406$ 6s. 10d.; the expenditure being less than in the previous year. The balance in hand, including $\pounds 162$ paid in advance for 1862, is $\pounds 1595$ 14s. Of this an amount of $\pounds 250$ 15s. 2d., is due on an invoice of drugs and surgical outfit to arrive from England. The average cost of each Patient has been greatly reduced, and is now for the In-patients under $\pounds 5$. An abstract of accounts is appended, and a detailed statement lies on the table for perusal. It will be observed that the Committee found it necessary to expend upwards of $\pounds 250$ in repairing and painting the Institution,

The Committee desire to express their thanks to the many liberal donors whose names appear in the list published herewith, and also to those gentlemen who have contributed Books and Papers to the Library; and to the Bible Society for a donation of forty bibles and testaments.

At the last Annual Meeting some alterations were made in the Rules relating to the Honorary Medical Staff; and the Committee expressed a hope that they would be found to work well. This hope has been realized as the harmonious and economic working of the management and the result of the treatment of the Patients amply testify.

To Messrs. Shaw and Walshe, the consulting medical officers, who again offer their services, the thanks of the Subscribers and the Committee are very justly due.

The several officers continue to fulfil their respective duties to the satisfaction of the Committee; and the popularity of the Institution may be judged of by the numerous applications for admission for treatment, in several cases from many parts of the country where similar institutions exist.

In conclusion, the Committee desire to state that nothing has occurred during the year to mar the prosperity and usefulness of the Institution. They have endeavoured to discharge the duties of the trust imposed on them so as to ensure an economic and at the same time effective system of management; and they trust they have succeeded to the satisfaction of the Subscribers.

OBJECTS.

I. That the objects of the Infirmary be to afford Medical and Surgical aid to poor persons requiring it, for a limited number of paving patients, and for casualties; but that no persons who shall meet with casualties, and shall be found able to pay for Surgical aid, shall receive further than temporary gratuitous assistance. That the object of the Benevolent Asylum be the reception of the Poor and Distressed, with a view to afford them consolation and assistance.

II. That a portion of the Building shall be set apart for the purposes of the Infirmary; and the remainder for the purposes of the Benevolent Asylum, at the discretion of the Committee,

QUALIFICATIONS AND PRIVILEGES OF GOVERNORS AND SUBSCRIBERS.

That every Benefactor of £25 or upwards, in one sum, be a Life-Subscriber, with liberty of having one in-patient and three outpatients admitted annually; and every contributor of £1 1s. and apwards annually, an Annual Subscriber, with liberty of having patients admitted as follows :- Annual Subscribers of £1 1s, to have four Outpatients' tickets; of £2 2s., one In-patient and two Out-patients; of £3 3s., two In-patients and four Out-patients; of £5 5s., four In-patients and eight Out-patients; of £10 10s., eight In-patients and eight Outpatients. Recommendations for admission to be subject to the approval of the House Committee, and to be made by Tickets only, to be issued by the Secretary or Collector, to Subscribers, at the time of their becoming such, and provided that whenever any recommendation cannot be acceded to, from want of room, or other cause appearing to the Committee, the ticket used in such recommendation shall be reclaimable by the Subscriber issuing the same. These tickets shall only be used for the recommendation of persons unable to pay for Medical attendance: and shall only be available till 31st January, in the year after that in which they are issued.

VII. That the Annual Subscriptions must be paid in advance for the current year, such year to be computed from the first day of January in each year, and no Governor or Subscriber will be entitled to any privilege until the subscription be paid. And no person shall be qualified to vote at any meeting of Subscribers, unless he shall have Subscribers tled to vote. been a Subscriber for the space of six months, previous to such meeting; provided always that where a Subscriber shall have paid his Subscription for the year immediately preceeding the year in which any public meeting shall take place, the payment of his Subscription for the then current year at any time before such meeting, shall entitle such Subscriber to vote, as required by Act of Council, 24, Vic, No. 116.

Infringement of the Rule will subject to instant dismissal.

35. They shall not allow clothes to be hung, nor dirt, or anything to he thrown out of the windows.

36. They shall administer to the patients at the times directed, the Medicines. diet. medicines and the diet prescribed, and they shall not suffer them to take any which are not prescribed, and they shall be careful to explain to the patients the instructions of the Resident Surgeon.

37. They shall not permit patients to receive from Visitors, medi- Regulations 199pecting visitors, cines, victuals, or liquor of any kind; nor allow any portion of medicine or diet, or any other thing to be removed from the wards by the patients or visitors, without an order from the Resident Surgeon.

38. They shall be careful to collect and carry to the Resident Sur-Emptyphials, etc geon all empty phials, gallipots, bandages, &c.; and to the Matron any articles of diet not consumed by the patients; and they shall attend at the Dispensary at the times appointed, to receive medicines and instructions.

47. No patient shall give reward or gratuity to any of the Wardsmen, Nurses, or other servants.

Megulations 1'0-:specting complaints.

48. Any patient having any cause of complaint shall make the same known to the Resident Surgeon, whose duty it shall be to enter such complaint immediately, in the presence of the nurse or wardsman of the ward, in a book kept for that purpose, which book shall be laid before the House Committee at each meeting.

49. Patients judged by the Resident Surgeon sufficiently convales. of cent to be able to assist in the work of the Institution shall be so oniployed.

50. Patients shall not sit up after 8 o'clock in the winter, or nine Regulations reo'clock in the summer; and all patients considered by the Resident Surgeon able to do so, shall rise by 7 o'clock in the summer and before 8 o'clock in the winter,

51. No venerial patients shall be admitted a second time, having Venerial patients. been once under treatment and cured.

52. Every patient offending against the above regulations will be Patients offending against the regulations to be discharged for irregularity.

VISITORS.

53. Visitors are admitted into the Institution on Sunday and Thurs- When admitted; visits limited to day in each week, between the hours of 3 and 5 o'clock in the afternoon; but no visitor is allowed to remain more than one hour. Not more than two visitors will be admitted to see each patient, except on special occasions, and by the leave of the Resident Surgeon or Secretary.

54. Visitors may be admitted on special occasions by a written order Special visits, from a member of the House Committee, addressed to the Resident Surgeon or Secretary,

55. Visitors will not be allowed to go into any ward without the Regulations releave of the Resident Surgeon or Secretary; and every visitor must retire when requested.

56. They will not be permitted to give to, or leave with any patient, any money, medicine food, or any liquor of any king, nor any other thing without the express sanction of the Resident Surgeon. Any one doing so will not be again admitted,

57. No visitor shall give to any Servant of the Institution any Notto give money or gratuity of any kind.

58. Visitors are requested not to interfere with the Wardsmen or Not to interfere, Nurses, and not to disturb the patients by loud talking or unnecessary noise.

59. Any Visitor violating any of the Regulations of the Institution Respecting visior behaving with impropriety, will be compelled to retire, and will not be re-admitted without special leave from the House Committee.
