OF THE

ELEVENTH ANNUAL MEETING OF GOVERNORS AND SUBSCRIBERS

Weelong Buffrmary and Wenevolent Rsylum,

Held at the Institution on Wednesday, 21st January, 1863,

REV. ANDREW LOVE,

The Chairman read the Advertisement calling the Meeting, and the Minutes of the last Annual Meeting were read and signed.

The Secretary then read the Report and Financial Statement of the Committee of Management for 1862, and the following Resolutions were agreed to unanimously:—

ELEVENTH ANNUAL REPORT.

IN presenting the Eleventh Annual Report of the Geelong Infirmary and Benevolent Asylum, the Committee of Management have great pleasure in informing the Governors and Subscribers that, in the goodness of Divine Providence, it has continued, during the past year to maintain its usefuluess, and to be an invaluable source of relief to a large number of the sick and destitute of the town and district, whose misfortunes have rendered an appeal to the aid of charity necessary.

The Vital Statistics which will be published with this Report will shew the operations of the Institution during the year. But, as is customary, it may be here noted, that 831 In-patients and Inmates --765 in the Infirmary, and 66 in the Benevolent Asylum---and 1552 Out-patients, in all 2383 persons, have received the aid of the Institution during the year. Of the In-patients and Inmates, 605 were discharged cured or relieved from the Infirmary; and 11 left the Benevolent Asylum of their own accord. Eighty-one (81) died in the Infirmary; and sixteen (16) in the Benevolent Asylum; and on 31st December, one hundred and eighteen (118)--79 in the Infirmary and 39 in the Benevolent Asylum, remained in the Institution. With reference to the treatment of Out-patients correct Statistics cannot be given, as not one-third of such patients report themselves after discontinuing to attend for advice.

The number of deaths has been greater than it was in 1861, but the per centage of deaths is below the average of years previous to that.

The Committee find that the most unusual number of 16 inquests, where death has resulted from accident, have been held; and beyond this 16 died from old age and decay of nature; 7 from Consumption; and 10 from Disease of the heart. The daily average of In-patients has been 123; and of Out-patients 63.

Patients reported themselves as belonging to the following religious

denominations:—Church of England, 263; Roman Catholic, 196; Presbyterian, 83; Wesleyan, 84; Jews, 5; Baptists, 4; Lutherans, 3; Calvanists, 8; Congregational, 3; Mahomedan, 1; and 105 professed no religion.

The Treasurer's Books and Vouchers, which have been duly audited by the auditors appointed at the last Annual Meeting, shew that the receipts, including the balance from previous year, have been $\pounds7,380$ 16s. 11d.; and the expenditure $\pounds6,731$ 14s. 9d., leaving a balance in hand of $\pounds649$ 2s. 2d. An Abstract of the Accounts and detailed Statement of Expenditure will be read. With reference to the Expenditure the Committee find that the average cost of each patient is nearly the same as it was last year: and they have reason to believe that this will bear favourable comparison with the expenditure of any other Institution of the kind.

In the expenditure is included sums of £1,129 5s. 9d. for New Buildings, and £92 5s. 6d. for Alterations. The overcrowded state of the wards for females, and the inconvenience, and perhaps in many cases, injury, to which Out-patients, and Patients waiting to be admitted, were exposed by having to remain in the passages and corridors until called, rendered some additions and alterations necessary; and a considerable balance being in hand from the previous year, the Committee felt justified in incurring the expenditure re-Tenders were advertised for and contracts taken, and ferred to. another storey was added to the late kitchen and laundry building, and three rooms (a convalescent patients dining and sitting-room, a bed-room for female servants, and a drying and clothes room), were A New Ward and Lavatory was added to the east wing, secured. and a dining and sitting-room for domestics was added to the west wing of the building. These were constructed so that they may be built upon at any future time. The ward that has been hitherto used as a female servants room has been converted into a ward for Benevolent Asylum females, and the room used as a domestic's dining and sitting-room made a waiting room for Patients waiting to be admitted, and for Out-patients. By these additions and re-arrangements the several wards are devoted to the purposes for which they were originally intended.

It is considered unnecessary to refer to Special Contributions, lists of which will be published; but the Committee desire to express their thanks for the manner in which subscribers and donors have strengthened their hands, and enabled them to maintain the usefulness and increase the efficiency of the Institution. The Committee have endeavoured to perform their duties in a manner which would meet with the approbation of those who entrusted them with the management of the Institution. They have been strictly careful to manage in accordance with the rules laid down for their guidance, and they trust they have succeeded.

With regard to the management, the Commissioners appointed by the Government to inquire into the the working of Municipal and Charitable Institutions have visited this Institution, and minutely enquired into every feature of its management. They expressed themselves satisfied with the fulness and completeness of the information, both verbally and in writing, which they had received, and their views on the management of the Institution will doubtless be recorded in their Report to the Government.

The thanks of the Subscribers are justly due to Drs. Foster Shaw and E. J. Walshe, whose services as Honorary Medical Officers have been freely and assiduously rendered. The Committee very highly appreciate the services rendered by these gentlemen, and desire to take this opportunity of acknowledging the value of their aid. Their interest in the welfare and prosperity of the Institution being undiminished they again offer their services for its benefit.

It would be tedious to enter here into more minute details of the working of the Institution. The Committee earnestly invite Subscribers to visit it, and examine and judge for themselves as to its value and efficiency, and in conclusion they most sincerely express their hope that the Institution may continue to prosper as it has done during the past year.

GENERAL BULES.

I. That the objects of the Infirmary be to afford Medical and Surgical aid to poor persons requiring it, for a limited number of paying patients, and for casualities; but that no persons who shall meet with casualities, and shall be found able to pay for Surgical aid, shall receive further than temporary gratuitous assistance. That the object of the Benevolent Asylum be the reception of the Poor and Distressed, with a view to afford them consolation and assistance.

II. That a portion of the Building shall be set apart for the purposes Appropriation of the Building. of the Infirmary; and the remainder for the purposes of the Benevolent Asylum, at the discretion of the Committee.

III. That the Government of the Institution shall be vested in a Institution, how governed. President, two Vice-Presidents, five Trustees, a Treasurer, and Governors, and Subscribers, as hereinafter described.

QUALIFICATIONS AND PRIVILEGES OF GOVERNORS AND SUBSCRIBERS.

IV. That every Benefactor of £50 or upwards be a Life-Governor, and every Annual Contributor of £20, an Annual Governor, with liberty of having one in-patient, or three out-patients, always on the books of the Institution, subject to the approval of the Committee of Management hereinafter mentioned, and provided that the funds of the Institution admit of the reception of such patients, and any public Institution contributing £50 in one sum shall be entitled to the privilege of a Governor for ten years from the date of such contribution.

V. That the Executor, or if more than one, the first named Executor under any will by which a bequest of £50 or upwards shall be made to bequests of £60. the Institution; and every Minister raising by one or more collections in his Church, in any one year, the sum of £20 or upwards; and any other L20. person, contributing a similar amount from any other source, shall have the rights and privileges of a Governor for one year only, commencing from the January following,:

VI. That every Benefactor of £25 or upwards, in one sum, be a Life-Subscriber, with liberty of having one in-patient and three outpatients admitted annually; and every contributor of $\pounds 1$ 1s. and

upwards annually, an Annual Subscriber, with liberty of having patients admitted as follows:-Annual Subscribers of £1 1s. to have four Outpatients' tickets; of £2 2s., one In-patient and two Out-patients; of £3 3s., two In-patients, and four Out-patients; of £5 5s., four In-patients and eight Out-patients; of £10 10s., eight In-patients and eight Outpatients. Recommendations for admission to be subject to the approval of the House Committee, and to be made by Tickets only, to be issued by the Secretary or Collector, to Subscribers, at the time of their becoming such, and provided that whenever any recommendation cannot be acceeded to, from want of room, or other cause appearing to the Committee, the ticket used in such recommendation shall be reclaimable by the Subscriber issuing the same. These tickets shall only be used for the recommendation of persons unable to pay for Medical attendance: and shall only be available till 31st January, in the year after that in which they are issued.

VII. That the Annual Subscriptions must be paid in advance for the current year, such year to be computed from the first day of January in each year, and no Governor or Subscriber will be entitled to any privilege until the subscription be paid. And no person shall be qualified to Subscribers enti-vote at any meeting of Subscribers, unless he shall have been a Subscriber for the space of six months, previous to such meeting; provided always that where a Subscriber shall have paid his Subscription for the year immediately preceeding the year in which any public meeting shall take place, the payment of his Subscription for the then current year at any time before such meeting, shall entitle such Subscriber to vote, as required by Act of Council, 24, Vic., No. 116.

The Committee of Management shall consist of the President, Vice-Presidents, Trustees, Treasurer, and Eighteen Governors or Subscribers, to be elected annually; six to form a quorum; and they shall have power to fill up vacancies that may occur in their number during the year, subject to Rule XIV.

XII. It shall be competent at any time for the Committee of Man-Special Meetings agement, at which at least eight members shall be present, or for nine or more Subscribers, by a writing under their hands, to require the Secretary to summon, at the expiration of fourteen days, a Special Meeting of Subscribers, the occasion of calling such meeting being stated in the requisition; and no business shall be transacted at such Special Meeting, except that for which it shall have been summoned. Every such meeting to be called by the Secretary, by advertisement in one of the public newspapers, published in Geelong, within three days of his receiving such requisition. Twelve Subscribers shall be necessary to form a General or Special Meeting.

XIII. That all Meeting of Subscribers be called by the Secretary, Meetings of Subscribers called by Advertiseby advertisement in one of the newspapers published in Geelong, at least ment. one week before the day of meeting.

XIV. In the event of any vacancy in the office of President, Vice-Honorary Officers Presidents, Treasurer, Trustees, or Auditors, the Election of a successor tion. shall take place at a Special Meeting of Subscribers, to be convened by the Committee of Management, which Election shall be by voting-tickets, as enjoined by Act of Council, 11 Vic., No. 59, section 9.

XV. And it shall be lawful at all meetings of Subscribers, for any Vote of Proxy Life-Governor or Life Subscriber who became such previous to 1861, as enjoined by Act of Council, to Vote by Proxy, such Proxy being also a Subscriber duly qualified; provided that such Proxy shall have his authority in writing, signed by the Governor or Subscriber; and such authority shall only extend to the one meeting especially named therein. XVIII. The Committee of Management shall choose, from among themselves, a House Committee of five, three to form a quorum, who shall meet on Monday and Thursday in each week, at 4 o'clock, p.m., and oftener if necessary; and who shall have power to admit patients, to examine and pass and pay the house accounts, to engage and discharge servants, and to regulate the internal management of the Institution, under the direction of the Committee of Management.

Annual Report. XIX. The Committee of Management shall present a General Report of the affairs of the Institution at the Annual Meeting of the Subscribers.

Accounts when to be andited. XX. The Accounts of the Institution shall be Audited once in every year, and presented at the Annual Meeting of Subscribers.

HONORARY MEDICAL STAFF.

Their qualifies. XXI The Honorary Medical Staff shall consist of four duly qualified general practitioners to be elected annually. No one shall be eligible for the appointment unless he can produce a Diploma from a recognised British University, or from one of the Royal Colleges of Surgeons of London, Edinburgh, or Dublin, or the Faculty of Physicians of Glasgow, together with a certificate from the Medical Board of Victoria.

The Resident Surgeon shall have the charge of all patients admitted; but the Honorary Medical Staff may visit the Institution at any time, and in case of their observing any neglect of or inattention to the patients it shall be their duty to report the same to the House Committee forthwith.

Rotation of duty. XXIII. Two of the Honorary Medical Staff shall attend in weekly rotation, on such days, and at such hours as may be most convenient, for consultation on the treatment of the patients: and they shall arrange the rotation of attendance.

Consultations to be held.

XXIV. The Honorary Medical Staff of the week shall attend for consultation on all important cases; and should any capital operation be deemed necessary the whole of the honorary medical staff shall be summoned for further consultation (except in cases of emergency) previous to the operation being performed, when, if then decided on, the whole of the honorary medical staff shall be requested to attend.

ADMISSION OF PATIENTS INTO THE INFIRMARY.

XXV. That accidents and such cases of decided emergency only as Admission the Infirmary. in the opinion of the Resident Surgeon cannot be delayed, be received into the Infirmary at any time without ticket, but that the admission of patients, in ordinary cases, be restricted to Monday and Thursday in each week, or at special meetings of the house committee, and then only on presenting a Subscriber's ticket.

ADMISSION OF PAYING PATIENTS.

XXVI. That Paying Patients be admitted on the usual days of Patients to be admitted. admission, without tickets, at the discretion of the Committee.

XXVII. That the amount chargable to each patient shall be at the amount to be charged. discretion of the Committee; and shall be paid in advance, or at the discretion of the Committee.

XXVIII. That the general rules and regulations of the Institution Rules applicable shall be applicable to, and strictly observed by, all paying patients to paying Pareceived into the Institution.

PERSONS NOT ADMISSABLE

XXIX. No pregnant female for the purpose of confinement; no Persons not admissable. person insane; no one having a contagious or infectious disease; no one subject to epilepsy; nor any one who, in the opinion of the Resident Surgeon, might receive equal benefit as an out-patient, shall be admitted; and no child under five years of age shall be admitted, except from an accident, or for a surgical operation.

Admission of Inmates into the Benevolent Asylum.

BENEVOLENT ASYLUM.

XXX. The admission of inmates into the Benevolent Asylum is Admission of Inmates. ordinarily restricted to Monday and Thursday in each week, but a meeting of the House Committee may be convened at any time to consider authenticated cases of utter destitution.

XXXI. No pregnant female for the purpose of confinement; no Persons not admissable. person insane; no child under twelve years of age; no one having a contagious or infectious disease, shall be admitted.

XXXII. Ministers of Religion shall have free access to persons of Ministers of Religion. their respective denominationt, at such times as shall be appointed by the Committee of Management; and when a patient requests that any minister may be sent for, his wish shall be immediately complied with.

XXXIII. That the Instruction of the patients in the Institution be left to the recognised religious teachers of the various denominations to which the patients belong; and it shall be understood that controversial works be prohibited.

XXXIV. He shall attend all Special, General, and Committee Meetings; he shall take minutes of the proceedings, and transcribe them carefully into books to be kept for that purpose, and he shall carry out the directions of such Meetings in the particulars incident to his department.

XXXV. He shall conduct the correspondence and other clerical business of his department, and he shall enter and keep the accounts of the Institution, under the direction of the Committee.

XXXVI. He shall be under the direction of the House Committee, and shall collect subscriptions and donations to the Institution, and pay over the same to the Treasurer, at least once in every week, and render account of the amount by him received since the last payment.

ALTERATION OF RULES.

Alteration of Rules. XXXVII. These Rules shall not be altered, except at a Special or General Meeting, due notice of any proposed alteration having been given, in accordance with Rule 12.

RESIDENT SURGEON.

1. No Candidate shall be eligible for the appointment of Resident Qualifications Surgeon unless he produces a diploma from either of the Royal Colleges of Surgeons of London, Edinburgh, or Dublin, together with a Certificate from the Medical Board of Victoria.

2. He shall reside in the house, and shall not leave it except on Regulations specting absence necessary occasions. He shall not be absent more than three hours at one time, or after Twelve o'clock at night, without the express leave of the House Committee. In case of absence, he shall inform the House Steward and Dispenser, and shall enter in a book kept for the purpose where he may be found.

N.B.-He and the House Steward and Dispenser shall never be absent at the same time.

3. He shall have the charge of all patients admitted, and shall charge of the Pa report to the House Committee at its next meeting any patient who may disorderly. have been disorderly. He shall make a special report to the House Committee on every patient who may have been two months in the Patients 2 months Institution; and he shall also report any case that may after consulta. In Institution to tion be considered incurable by the Honorary Medical Staff, to be dealt incurable cases to be reported. with as the Committee may see fit.

Internal control.

Servants,

4. He shall have the general superintendance of the internal affairs of the Institution, under the direction of the House Committee. He shall preserve order and sobriety, and in case of insubordination or gross default of duty on the part of any servant, he shall suspend or discharge such servant until the next meeting of the House Committee; and, if necessary, he shall provisionally hire a substitute for such servant so suspended or discharged, and he shall report his having done so, with the cause of such suspension or discharge, to the House Committee at their next meeting; but he shall in no case absolutely discharge, or permanently hire, any servant of the Institution, without the sanction of the House Committee.

Medicines, medical instruments, 5. He shall have charge of, and keep the surgical instruments in furniture, etc. proper order; and shall be accountable for the medicines, medical and charge of them, inventory of surgical instruments, utensils and stores, excapt such as are in charge of the House Steward and Dispenser, or Matron; and he shall prepare an Inventory in the month of December, in every year, and at such other times as the Committee may direct, of all furniture, utensils, medicines, and stores, under his charge, and such Inventory shall be recorded from year to year, in a book to be kept for that purpose.

Books to be kept.
6. He shall enter regularly, in proper books to be kept for such purposes, the names of the patients as they are admitted and discharged, and note the nature and history of their diseases while under treatment; the receipt, issue, and expenditure, loss or breakage, of medicines, medical instruments, and other things in his charge, and the disbursement of Attend the weekly petty cash; and he shall have such books ready at all times for the meetings of the inspection of the House Committee; and he shall attend the weekly tee, patients' money, meetings of the House Committee; and he shall account for the same weekly to the House Committee.

Visit each patient -complaints.

7. He shall visit each patient every morning and evening, and shall inquire if the treatment prescribed has been attended to, and if any cause of complaint exist. Should any patient have a complaint to prefer, he shall enter it immediately in the Patients' Complaint Book, in the presence of the Wardsman or Nurse of the Ward, and he shall lay such book before the House Committee at each meeting.

Condition of the wards, etc.

8. He shall, on his visits to the Wards, examine their condition with respect to cleanliness, temperature, and ventilation; and he shall observe if the Wardsmen and Nurses have done their duty.

9. He shall affix to the bed of each patient a card, stating the patients' name, age, religion, disease, date of admission, diet, and the name of the subscriber by whom recommended.

10. He shall write, or cause to be written, upon every medicine Medicines, parti-culars to be dispensed by him or the Dispenser, the name of the patient for whom it written on them is prescribed, and the time at and the manner in, which it is to be administered, and this, however frequently the same medicine may be repeated; and he shall cause the medicines to be administered as directed; and he shall keep, or cause to be kept, a proper supply of the Supply for accinecessary apparatus for cases of accident or emergency, ready for gency cases. immediate use.

1). He shall inspect the diet of the patients, and see that it is of Inspect diet. etc. good quality, and properly prepared; and such as is ordered; and that the patients do not partake of any food, liquor, or medicines, except that prescribed.

He shall procure such articles in small quantities, in his depart- To purchase small ment as may be required during the week; but he shall not purchase any article, nor enter into any contract for the Institution, exceeding £2, without the sanction of the Committee; and he shall on the last days of February, May, August, and November, prepare and submit to the List of Medicines, House Committee, a List of medicines, medical or surgical instruments. utensils and stores as may be required during the ensuing quarter.

13. He shall regularly consult with the Honorary Medical Staff on Consultations in important cases. any important case, in accordance with 24 of General Rules. And he shall afford them every facility for examining and for offering opinion Opinion on cases, on the treatment of all cases admitted; and shall record the result of Ke-Consultations, every consultation in the case book.

14. He shall give due notice in writing to the Honorary Medical Notice of Consultations Staff, when a consultation is to be held or an operation performed, to he given. and consult their desires with regard to the performance of capital Operations. operations.

15. He shall not be concerned in any private Medical or Surgical No private pracpractice.

MATRON.

22. She shall be subject to the same regulations, respecting living in the house and absence therefrom, as the House Steward and Dispenser.

N.B.-She and the House Steward and Dispenser shall never be absent at the same sime.

23. She shall see that the Nurses and Female Servants do their Superintendence of Nurses and female servants. duty: and shall report any neglect or disobedience of orders on their their part to the House Steward and Dispenser.

24. She shall visit each Ward daily, and shall see that the beds, Visit and inspect the Wards daily, linen, and clothes of the patients, are clean and in good order; and shall cause such of the bedding, &c., as require it to be replaced by others and thoroughly cleansed and repaired where necessary.

25 She shall superintend the Laundry, and shall be accountable to the House Steward and Dispenser for the return from the Laundry of all clothes sent to be washed or cleansed, keeping an account of everything taken to the Laundry and received therefrom.

26. She shall see that all patients' clothes, as they are admitted, are Patients' clothes. care of. cleansed and put carefully away; and shall enter in a book a list of all patients' clothes as they are received, and procure the receipt of each patient for their clothes when they leave. And shall not permit any of the patient's clothes to be removed from the store but in her presence.

27. She shall personally superintend the cooking of all food for the $\frac{T_0}{the cooking}$. superintend inmates: and shall generally discharge the duties of Matron as shall be directed by the Committee,

WARDSMEN, NURSES, AND SERVANTS.

28. The Wardsmen and Nurses shall be constantly in their Wards, Attendance of wardsmen and Nurses. Nurses. and regular in their attendance upon the patients.

29. They shall obey the Resident Surgeon and House Steward and Their deportment Dispenser as their masters; they shall behave with tenderness to all the patients, with civility and respect to strangers; they shall withdraw from the Wards when the House Committee enter them, unless particularly requested to remain; and they shall take no presents or gratuity in money or otherwise from the patients, their friends, or strangers, who may visit the Institution, on any pretence whatever. Infringement of the Rule will subject to instant dismissal.

Laundry.

Absence

- Permission for 30. No Wardsman, Nurse, or Servant, shall leave the Institution temporary ab without permission of the Resident Surgeon or House Steward and Dispenser.
- Personal cleanliness; by what time in the sonal cleanliness; they shall have their respective Wards swept and morning Wards, thoroughly cleansed, and all dirt and rubbish removed from them by 7 and dirt, etc., removed. o'clock in the morning in the summer, and before 8 o'clock in the morn-

ing in winter.

- Breakfast. 32. They shall serve up Breakfast to the patients at 8 o'clock in the morning.
- Details to 33. They shall have the several chamber utensils scalded every promote morning and scoured as often as may be necessary, and kept out of the wards during the day, unless specially required.

cleanliness.

34. They shall pay great attention to the bedding of the patients, and have the mattresses thoroughly aired and dried when necessary, and the sheets, blankets, and counterpanes renewed as often as required.

35. They shall not allow clothes to be hung, nor dirt, or anything to be thrown out of the windows.

- Modicines, diet, etc. 36. They shall administer to the patients at the times directed, the medicines and the diet prescribed, and they shall not suffer them to take any which are not prescribed, and they shall be careful to explain to the patients the instructions of the Resident Surgeon.
- Regulations respecting visitors, etc. 37. They shall not permit patients to receive from Visitors, medicines, victuals, or liquor of any kind; nor allow any portion of medicine or diet, or any other thing to be removed from the wards by the patients or visitors, without an order from the Resident Surgeon.

Empty phials, etc. 38. They shall be careful to collect and carry to the Resident Surfood not used; is at the geon all empty phials, gallipots, bandages, &c.; and to the Matron any Dispensary for articles of diet not consumed by the patients; and they shall attend at the Dispensary at the times appointed, to receive medicines and instructions.

Watch and report 39. They shall watch attentively the state and symptoms of the patients' state and symptoms patients, more especially in urgent or uncommon cases, and report these distinctly to the Resident Surgeon, or in his absence the House Steward and Dispenser; or in case of females to the Matron.

40. They shall not admit any stranger into any ward without the Admission strangers. permission of the Resident Surgeon or the Secretary.

41. One Wardsman or Nurse in rotation shall be on duty from 8 Wardsman Nurse on night o'clock every night to 6 o'clock the following morning, and shall visit duty. each ward once in every two hours, or more frequently if necessary, and shall pay due attention to such patients as may require it, and, should there be occasion, shall communicate with the Resident Surgeon.

42. All Wardsmen, Nurses, and Servants shall be obedient to the Wardsmen, Nurses, and Regulations of the Institution, and they shall report immediately to the Resident Surgeon, House Steward and Dispenser, or Matron, any impropriety of conduct or infringement of them by any patient, visitor, or other person; and if such complaint be not properly attended to, they shall report the same to the House Committee at its next meeting.

PATIENTS.

43. Patients shall conduct themselves orderly, and shall strictly Conduct; observe directions. observe all the directions of the Resident Surgeon, House Steward and Dispenser, Matron, Wardsmen, and Nurses.

44. They shall take their medicines at the time directed, and they Medicines and diet. shall take no other medicines than those prescribed; and they shall not conceal nor put away any portion of the medicine or diet administered to them.

45. No one shall leave his or her ward, and go into another ward or Details respecting liberty to leave the Wards, ab-sence, visitors, apartment, nor leave the house nor remain out for a longer time than is granted, nor shall introduce visitors, nor receive medicines, victuals, etc. liquors, or any thing, without express leave of the Resident Surgeon

46. They shall not play at cards or dice, nor gamble or smoke, nor Details respecting deapliness and spit on the floor, nor deface or injure any part of the ward, nor any furconduct, niture, bedding or clothing therein, nor sing, blaspheme or use rude or indecent language

47. No patient shall give reward or gratuity to any of the Wards- Nottogivereward or gratuity. men, Nurses, or other servants,

48. Any patient having any cause of complaint shall make the same Regulations reecting comknown to the Resident Surgeon, whose duty it shall be to enter such plaints, complaint immediately, in the presence of the nurse or wardsman of the ward, in a book kept for that purpose, which book shall be laid before the House Committee at each meeting.

49. Patients judged by the Resident Surgeon sufficiently convales. Employment of convalescent pacent to be able to assist in the work of the Institution shall be so emtients. ployed.

50. Patients shall not sit up after 8 o'clock in the winter, or nine Regulations re- 50. Patients shall not sit up after 8 o'clock in the winter, or nine and stimg up, o'clock in the summer; and all patients considered by the Resident Surgeon able to do so, shall rise by 7 o'clock in the summer, and before 8 o'clock in the winter.

Venerial patients. 51. No venerial patients shall be admitted a second time, having been once under treatment and cured.

52. Every patient offending against the above regulations will be Patients offending against the re-gulations to be discharged for irregularity. discharged.

VISITORS.

53. Visitors are admitted into the Institution on Sunday and Thurs-When admitted ; visits limited to one hour. day in each week, between the hours of 3 and 5 o'clock in the afternoon; but no visitor is allowed to remain more than one hour. Not more than two visitors will be admitted to see each patient, except on special occasions, and by the leave of the Resident Surgeon or Secretary.

Special visits.

54, Visitors may be admitted on special occasions by a written order from a member of the House Committee, addressed to the Resident Surgeon or Secretary.

55. Visitors will not be allowed to go into any ward without the Regulations Υθspecting visits, leave of the Resident Surgeon or Secretary; and every visitor must retire when requested.

> 56. They will not be permitted to give to, or leave with any patient any money, medicine, food, or any liquor of any kind, nor any other thing without the express sanction of the Resident Surgeon. Any one doing so will not be again admitted.

57. No visitor shall give to any Servant of the Institution any Not to give money or gratuity. money or gratuity of any kind.

58. Visitors are requested not to interfere with the Wardsmen or Not to interfere. etc.; quietness, Nurses, and not to disturb the patients by loud talking or unnecessary noise.

59. Any Visitor violating any of the Regulations of the Institution Respecting visi-tors violating tors violating the regulations, or behaving with impropriety, will be compelled to retire, and will not be or behaving imre-admitted without special leave from the House Committee. properly.
