### Geelong Instrmary and Benebolent Asylum, Held at the Institution, Tuesday, 23rd January, 1866.

RICHARD PARKER, Esq., J.P., In the Chair.

THE Chairman called upon the Secretary to read the advertisement calling the Meeting; and this having been done, the Fourteenth Annual Report and Financial Statement of the Committee of Management was read.

> Rev. W. Cuttle moved, and EDWARD KNIGHT, Esq., seconded—

That the Report and Financial Statement now read be adopted and printed, under the direction of the Committee of Management, together with the usual Statistics, Lists of Subscriptions, Rules, &c. (Carried.)

# Geelong Infirmary and Benebolent Asylum.

Humbly acknowledging the goodness and mercy of Almighty God, whose blessing has been besought on their labours, the Committee of Management present the Fourteenth Annual Report with much thankfulness, for although sickness and destitution have increased during the past year, they have reason to congratulate the Subscribers on the effective aid rendered by the Institution in providing for the requirements of the district.

The number of persons who have obtained the aid of the Institution during the year is 2,651—821 inside the House, and 1,830 Out-patients. Of the In-patients, 591 were discharged cured, 67 died, and 76 remained at the end of the year. Of the inmates of the Benevolent Asylum, 22 left, 13 died, and 52 remained. 128 remained in the House on 31st December, 1865, viz.: 76 patients and 52 inmates. The daily average number in the House has been 134. In 1864 the daily average was 125.

Of the inmates and patients admitted to the House during the year, 239 were from England, 198 from Ireland, 87 from Scotland, 70 Natives of Victoria, 14 from Switzerland, 6 from America, 6 from Wales, 5 from New South Wales, 4 from Tasmania, 4 from Prussia, 2 from Norway, 1 from Corsica, 1 from Sweden, 1 from France, 1 from Cape of Good Hope, 1 from Schleswig, 1 from Denmark, 1 from Jamaica, 1 from Nova Scotia, 2 from St. Helena, 1 from Nassau, 1 from Portugal, 4 from Holland, 1 from Sicily, 1 from Calcutta, 1 Aboriginal Native, and the remainder unknown.

Of the above—254 were Episcopalians, 226 Roman Catholics, 87 Presbyterians, 19 Lutherans, 36 Wesleyans, 6 Independents, 4 Calvinists, 6 Baptists, 2 Bible Christians, 2 Jews, 1 Mohamedan—and of the remainder, the necessary information could not be obtained.

It will be observed that the daily average number of persons in the House has greatly increased. There have been as many as 153 in the House at one time, (at this date there are 153 in the House), and this number is so much beyond what medical report and experience have decided should be what the present building can properly accommodate, (the Resident Surgeon also having reported on the danger of overcrowding the wards,) that the Committee, unwilling to stop admissions, determined to make an effort to get the accommodation increased by extending the building. Plans were agreed to, estimates obtained for building two large wards, and an appeal, by deputation, was made to the Government that a portion of the amount voted by the Legislative Assembly on account of Charitable Institutions for building purposes, should be granted to this Institution. The Hon, the Treasurer, on behalf of the Government, acknowledged the urgency of the matter, and promised that a portion of the Grant should be appropriated to this Institution. however, to the circumstances which have arisen in the Government, no sum has yet been obtained, and the Committee have been unable to proceed with the work. But it is hoped that ere long the required amount will be secured, and confidently appealing to the public for the necessary subscriptions to claim the grant, the execution of the work is earnestly recommended.

The Receipts from all sources have been £5,789 18s. 10d.; and the Expenditure, £5,847 17s. 2d.; leaving a balance against the Institution of £57 18s. 4d. This, together with

£420 for Subscriptions for building, and in advance for 1866, would make an apparent deficiency of £477 18s. 4d. But, as at the end of the year, a portion of the Grant-in-aid (which has since been received,) more than sufficient to meet this was due from the Government, there is really a small balance in favour of the Institution.

As the Subscribers are aware there has been a considerable increase in the cost of the main articles of provision, &c., during the past year, the gross expenditure has consequently increased in proportion, and unless this is borne in mind might appear unduly large. The expenditure also includes the payment of £354 for the erection of new Bath Room and appurtenances, which have been completed during the year, and were referred to in the last Report.

The usual statistical information will accompany this Report, nd the Committee believe that the Subscribers cannot but be atisfied with the results of the operations of the Institution uring the year. To the Honorary Medical Officers, Messrs. haw and Walshe, the Committee express their thankfulness for heir kindness and attention.

The Committee feel that they cannot close their Report with repriety without expressing their high satisfaction at the adustry and attentive zeal displayed by the several paid officers f the Institution in the discharge of their duties.

### GENERAL RULES.

I. That the objects of the Infirmary be to afford Medical and OBJECTS. Surgical aid to poor persons requiring it, for a limited number of paying patients, and for casualties; but that no persons who shall meet with casualties, and shall be found able to pay for Surgical aid, shall receive further than temporary gratuitous assistance. That the object of the Benevolent Asylum be the reception of the poor and distressed, with a view to afford them consolation and assistance.

II. That a portion of the Building shall be set apart for the purposes Appropriation of of the Infirmary; and the remainder for the purposes of the Benevolent Asylum, at the discretion of the Committee.

III. That the Government of the Institution shall be vested in a Institution, President, two Vice-Presidents, five Trustees, a Treasurer, Governors. and Subscribers, as hereinafter described.

QUALIFICATIONS AND PRIVILEGES OF GOVERNORS AND STESCRIBERS.

IV. That every Benefactor of £50 or upwards be a Life-Governor, Governors. and every annual Contributor of £20 an Annual Governor, with liberty of having one in-patient, or three out-patients, always on the books of the Institution, subject to the approval of the Committee of Management hereinafter mentioned, and provided that the funds of the Institution admit of the reception of such patients; and any public Institution contributing £50 in one sum shall be entitled to the privilege of a Governor for ten years from the date of such contribution.

V. That the Executor, or if more than one, the first named Executors, where tor under any will by which a bequest of £50 or upwards shall be made to the Institution : and every Minister raising by one or more collec- Ministers raising tions in his Church, in any one year, the sum of £20 or upwards; and any other person contributing a similar amount from any other source, shall have the rights and privileges of a Governor for one year only, commencing from the January following.

VI. That every benefactor of £25 or upwards, in one sum, be a Subscribers. Life-Subscriber, with liberty of having one in-patient and three outpatients admitted annually; and every contributor of £1 1s. and upwards annually, an Annual Subscriber, with liberty of having patients admitted as follows: - Annual Subscribers of £1 1s. to have One In patient's Ticket and Two Out-patients' Tickets; of £2 2s. Two In-patients' and Four Out-patients'; of £3 3s. Three In-patients' and Six Out-patients'; of £5 5s., and so on up to £20, One In-patient; and Two Out-patients' Tickets for every additional £1 1s. mendations for admission to be subject to the approval of the House Committee, and to be made by Tickets only, to be issued by the Secretary or Collector, to Subscribers, at the time of their becoming such, and provided that whenever any recommendation cannot be accoded to, from want of room, or other cause appearing to the Committee, the ticket used in such recommendation shall be reclaimable by the Subscriber issuing the same. Subscribers shall also have the privilege at any time, on application to the Secretary, of exchanging out-patients' tickets for in-patients', and vice versa-one in-patient's ticket being equivalent to three out-patients'. These tickets shall only be used for the recommendation of persons unable to pay for Medical attendance: and shall only be available till 31st January in the year after that in which they are issued.

That the Annual Subscriptions must be paid in advance for the current year, such year to be computed from the first day of January in each year, and no Governor or Subscriber will be entitled to any privilege until the subscription be paid. #### COMMITTEE OF MANAGEMENT.

Annual Report.

XIX. The Committee of Management shall present a General Report of the affairs of the Institution at the Annual Meeting of the Subscribers.

Accounts when to be Audited.

XX. The Accounts of the Institution shall be Audited once in every year, and presented at the Annual Meeting of Subscribers.

### HONORARY MEDICAL STAFF.

Their qualification. XXI. The Honorary Medical Staff shall consist of four duly qualified general practitioners, to be elected annually. No one shall be eligible for the appointment unless he can produce a Diploma from a recognised British University, or from one of the Royal Colleges of Surgeons of London, Edinburgh, or Dublin, or the Faculty of Physicians of Glasgow, together with a certificate from the Medical Board of Victoria.

Charge of Patients and visiting.

XXII. The Resident Surgeon shall have the charge of all patients' admitted; but the Honorary Medical Staff may visit the Institution at any time, and in ease of their observing any neglect of, or inattention to, the patients it shall be their duty to report the same to the House Committee forthwith.

Rotation of duty,

XXIII. Two of the Honorary Medical Staff shall attend in weekly rotation, on such days, and at such hours as may be most convenient, for consultation on the treatment of the patients: and they shall arrange the rotation of attendance.

XXIV. The Honorary Medical Staff of the week shall attend for Consultation consultation on all important cases; and should any capital operation be deemed necessary the whole of the Honorary Medical Staff shall be summoned for further consultation (except in cases of emergency) previous to the operation being performed, when, if then decided on, the whole of the Honorary Medical Staff shall be requested to attend.

XXV. That accidents and such cases of decided emergency only, as Admission into in the opinion of the Resident Surgeon cannot be delayed, be received into the Infirmary at any time without ticket; but that the admission of patients, in ordinary cases, be restricted to Monday and Thursday in each week, or at special meetings of the House Committee, and then only on presenting a Subscriber's Ticket.

### PERSONS NOT ADMISSIBLE.

XXIX. No pregnant female for the purpose of confinement; no person insane; no one having a contagious or infectious disease; no one subject to epilepsy; nor any one who, in the opinion of the Resident Surgeon, might receive equal benefit as an out-patient, shall be admitted; and no child under five years of age shall be admitted, except from an accident, or for a surgical operation. Provided that the House Committee or Officers of the Institution shall have discretionary power to admit such prohibited cases, and shall report upon the exercise of such power at any time to the next General Meeting of the Committee of Management.

Religious Instruction. XXXIII. That the Instruction of the patients in the Institution be left to the recognised religious teachers of the various denominations to which the patients belong; and it shall be understood that controversial works be prohibited.

XXXIV. He shall attend all Special, General, and Committee-Meetings: he shall take minutes of the proceedings, and transcribe them carefully into books to be kept for that purpose, and he shall carry out the directions of such Meetings in the particulars incident to his department.

Correspondence and Accounts. XXXV. He shall conduct the correspondence and other clerical business of his department, and he shall enter and keep the accounts of the Institution, under the direction of the Committee.

XXXVI. He shall be under the direction of the House Committee, and shall collect subscriptions and donations to the Institution, and pay over the same to the Treasurer, at least once in every week, and render account of the amount received by him since the last payment.

Alteration of Rules. XXXVII. These Rules shall not be altered, except at a Special or General Meeting of Subscribers, due notice of any proposed alterations having been given, in accordance with Rule 12.

In case of absence, he shall inform the House Steward and Dispenser, and shall enter in a book kept for the purpose where he may be found.

- 47. No patient shall give reward or gratuity to any of the Not to give reward or gratuity. Wardsmen, Nurses, or other servants.
- 48. Any patient having any cause of complaint shall make the same Regulations respecting known to the Resident Surgeon, whose duty it shall be to enter such complaint immediately, in the presence of the Nurse or Wardsman of the Ward, in a book kept for that purpose, which book shall be laid before the House Committee at each meeting.

- Employment of 49. Patients judged by the Resident Surgeon sufficiently convalescent convalescent pa- to be able to assist in the work of the Institution shall be so employed.
- Regulations respecting rising Nine o'clock in the summer; and all patients considered by the Resident Surgeon able to do so, shall rise by Seven o'clock in the summer, and before Eight o'clock in the winter.
- Venercal patients. 51. No venercal patients shall be admitted a second time, having been once under treatment and cured.
- Patients offend- 52. Every patient offending against the above Regulations will be regulations to discharged for irregularity. be discharged.

#### VISITORS.

- When admitted; 53. Visitors are admitted into the Institution on Sunday and visits limited to one hour.

  Thursday in each week, between the hours of three and five o'clock in the afternoon, but no visitor is allowed to remain more than one hour.

  Not more than two visitors will be admitted to see each patient, except on special occasions, and by the leave of the Resident Surgeon, or Secretary.
- Special visits. 54. Visitors may be admitted on special occasions by a written order from a member of the House Committee, addressed to the Resident Surgeon or Secretary.
- Regulations repecting visits. leave of the Resident Surgeon or Secretary; and every visitor must retire when requested.
  - 56. They will not be permitted to give to, or leave with any patient any money, medicines, food, or liquor of any kind, nor any other thing without the express sanction of the Resident Surgeon. Any one doing so will not be again admitted.
- Notto give money of the Institution any money or gratuity.

  Moving the Institution any money or gratuity of any kind.
- Not to interfere, 58. Visitors are requested not to interfere with the Wardsmen or Surses, and not to disturb the patients by loud telking or unnecessary noise.
- Respecting visitors violating so the Institution, tors violating or behaving with impropriety, will be compelled to retire, and will not or behaving improperly.
