## THE THIRTY-NINTH ANNUAL REPORT.


The General Commitmee of Managemmet have the honor to submit the following Report to the Governors and Contributors to the Institution, for the year ending 30th June, 1891.

During the last twelve months 2279 cases have received relief, viz :-

The daily average in the House has been 157.
The average rate of mortality has been 9.2 per cent. for all cases, and $9 \cdot 7$ for Hospital Indoor Patients.

The total number remaining in the House on the 30th June, 1891, was 159.

The Religions and Birth-places of those treated in the Institution during the year have been as follows:-


According to the Financial Statement (duly audited) the total receipts were $£ 62969$ s. 2d., including legacies and special bequests.

Total Expenditure, $£ 6274$ 1s. 5 d . for maintenance, repairs to buildings, etc.

The amount at present to the credit of the Endowment Fund is $£ 8500$ 3s. 9d.

Your Committee would here call attention to the fact, that for some time past the private subscriptions to the Hospital Funds have been falling off, which accounts for the existence of the present large overdraft; and they would urge upon all contributors the necessity of increased efforts being made by them towards the support of the Institution.

During the past year Mr E. Sharp, who had held the position of Secretary and Superintendent to the Institution since 1872, resigned, and in recognition of his long services your Committee voted him a bonus of three months' salary, and his comnection with the Institution terminated 30th ult. Mr Alliott Hopkins, who was for some years Governor and Superintendent of Dr. Barnardo's Institutions in Jersey, Channel Islands, and since then Secretary to the Charity Organisation Society, Melbourne, was selected by the Committee out of 88 candidates to fill the vacancy.

The position of House Steward and Dispenser is now filled by Mr W. A. London owing to the resignation of Mr W. C. Kernot, who had served the Hospital in that capacity for five years to the satisfaction of the Committee.

Additional accommodation for Out-Patients has been provided, thereby doing away with the necessity of treating them in the Operating Room, which is now only used for the purpose for which it was intended.

The Committee have pleasure in amouncing that during the past year two tents have been procured, each capable of holding 9 beds; these are specially designed for the use of Typhoid cases; and results have proved that the mortality from this disease is lessened by their treatuneut in these tents, which are capable of better ventilation than permanent wards. The cost amounted in all to £233 3s. 7d.

The Inspector of Charities (Mr W. G. Brett) visited the Institution in June last; and his copy Report to the Under Treasurer, though commenting unfavourably on the structural defects of the buildings compared with those of modern erection, is on the whole favourable regarding the management of the Institution.

The Hospital and Benevolent Asylum were also visited by the members of the Royal Commission on Charities in March of this year; and evidence was afterwards taken at the Town Hall, when Mr W. P. Carr (President), Mr J. H. Grey, Rev. Canon Goodman, Dr. Kenuedy, and Mr E. Sharp attended as witnesses. The result of the deliberations of this Commission will not be known, until its report is presented to Parliament.

With reference to the question of building a new Hospital dealt with by a resolution carried at the last annual meeting, the Committee, whilst recognising the desirability of new buildings, wish to point out, that as it was also agreed at the same meeting that a separation between the Benevolent Asylum and the Hospital was desirable, and as outdoor and to a certain extent indoor relief is also administered by the Ladies' Benevolent Association of Geelong, negotiations with the latter Association were opened up with a view to ascertain whether an amalgamation of benevolent aid distributed by your Institution and the Ladies' Benevolent Association could not be effected. Those negotiations are now under way, and your Committee hope may eventuate in an amalgamation being effected, in which case the Hospital would be freed from the Benevolent Asylum altogether.

As regards the Hospital a change of site has been mooted; and, if an equally good position to the present could be found, the ground on which the Hospital now stands might be sold, and the proceeds, with the amount now in hand, would enable your Committee to provide a Hospital second to none in the colony. As confirming this last paragraph reference may be made to the following extract from the report of Mr Brett, the Inspector of Charities-;

The Reserve of 5a. 0r. 13p., is one of the most valuable sites in Geelong, and would realize about $£ 15,000$ if sold, which amount, with the endowment Fund of $£ 4,500$ availablefor Building purposes, would enable the Committee to buy another site, and erect a Hospital on modern lines, and replete with all the latest improvements; but I do not think that in the new buildings the Hospital and Benerolent Asylum should be combined.

During the past year 15 meetings of the General Committee of Management, 53 of the House Committee, 16 of the Finance Cornmittee, and 2 of the Building' Committee have been held; and your thanks are due to the members of these several Committees for the indefatigable way in which they have performed their duties. A list of attendances is appended.

As in previous years the members of the Flower Mission have continued to visit the sick in the Hospital Wards, thereby comforting and cheering them in their affliction. The thanks of the Committee are hereby tendered to Mrs. Hitchcock and those ladies who share the good work with her.

The thanks of the Committee are also offered to the proprietors of the Argus, Age, Geelong Advertiser and Geelong Times for the daily gratuitous supply of their papers; also to all kind friends who have from time to time sent parcels of papers, periodicals, ete.; these are always welcomed by the inmates, and help to pass away pleasantly many a winter's evening.

The Honorary Medical Staff have, as in the past, rendered most valuable services to the Hospital; and your Committee hereby beg to record their genuine appreciation of the same.

The services in the Chapel attached to the Institution have been conducted by the ministers of the various denominations, and also the visitation of the sick in the Wards; and your Committee take this opportunity of thanking these gentlemen for their efforts to alleviate the cares of the sick and dying.

The following named gentlemen have during the year resigned their positions on the Committee : Rev. J. H. Toms, Rer. A. R. Edgar, Mr W. Higgins, Mr J. Richardson and Mr G. Sawyer, and their places, together with that of Dr. Small, who retires as having been appointed by the Committee, will have to be filled at the Annual Meeting.
