



The FORTY-SECOND ANNUAL REPORT of the General Committee of Management.



TO THE GOVERNORS AND SUBSCRIBERS.

LADIES AND GENTLEMEN,—Once more the Financial Year is ended, and your Committee is glad to be able to report satisfactorily on the work of the Institution.

The Inspector of Charities in his recent Report says:—
"The claims of the Institution have been fairly recognised by
the public, and its usefulness and efficiency maintained at a
time when a falling-off of subscriptions might have been expected, but fortunately was not felt at this Hospital."

Your Committee has much pleasure in being able to endorse these remarks. The private subscriptions in 1892-93 were £906 10s. 5d., and in the past year £883 14s. 3d. This shows a decrease of only  $2\frac{1}{2}$  per centum, which is highly creditable to the inhabitants of the town and district during a year of almost unprecedented depression.

During the year ended June 30th 2152 cases have received relief. Full particulars are given in the following tables:—

The average rate of mortality has been  $11\cdot2$  per cent. for all cases, and  $10\cdot2$  for Hospital Indoor Patients.

#### INCOME AND EXPENDITURE.

From the Balance Sheet (duly audited) it will be seen that the total receipts for maintenance purposes were £5210 13s. 10d. and £900 was transferred from the Endowment Fund in payment of New Dining Room and Fittings.

The total receipts from all sources amounted to  $\pounds 6110$  13s. 10d., and the total expenditure under all heads to  $\pounds 6288$  19s. 1d.

Thus the year's income falls short of the expenditure by £178 5s. 3d.

The Government Grant 1898-94 was reduced £250, or there would have been a surplus of £71 14s. 9d.

The Bank Overdraft on July 1st, 1892, was £242 7s. 1d.; on July 1st, 1893, £149 12s. 5d.; and on July 1st, 1894, £327 17s. 8d.

The expenditure under all heads since July 1st, 1892, has been £12,218 7s. 11d., and the receipts from all sources £12,132 17s. 4d. This shows a deficit of £85 10s. 7d. in the two years, and against this may be set increased stock and substantial repairs executed.

#### REDUCTION OF GOVERNMENT GRANT.

For the year 1893-94 the Government reduced the Charitable Vote £10,000, and the result was that the Grant to this Institution was cut down £250. This, of course, calls for increased support on the part of the public, as the same work has to be done, and efficiency must not be impaired through lack of funds.

On the 1st July, 1892, this was put in force, and since that date all out patients who could afford it have been asked to pay 6d for their medicine. The first year £57 1s. was received, and this year £65 9s., and no one has been compelled to pay who said they could not afford to do so.

#### IMPROVEMENTS.

The new dining rooms are mentioned elsewhere.

A room for storing mattrasses, with batten shelves, was built by the Institution carpenter, and is found very useful.

Recently the old bathroom attached to Nos. 2 and 3 Wards has been converted into a pantry, thus relieving the passage way between the two Wards, which up to that time had served for pantry and scullery.

The <u>lavatory</u> has been made into a <u>bathroom</u>, and has been fitted with an earthenware <u>sink</u> with <u>hot</u> and <u>cold</u> water laid on.

The Reliable Gas Regulators have been fixed to the meters, and have effected a considerable saving in the consumption of gas.

A number of substantial repairs have been executed; amongst others may be mentioned the re-lining with lead of the cisterns in Nos. 9 and 11 Wards.

A new hot water tank has been fitted up behind the kitchen.

The Institution painter has had his hands full all the year, and has amongst other work done the following:—Out patients' male and female waiting and consulting rooms; the corridors up and down stairs and staircase; the nurses' mess room; the chapel; the matron's sitting room and bed room; the scullery and bread room; and a large amount of other jobs too numerous to specify.

The kitchen was thoroughly painted by contract.

#### INSPECTOR OF CHARITIES REPORT.

A copy of the Inspector of Charities Report to the Under Treasurer of the Colony was received at the close of May. It spoke in terms of praise of the work that had been done in the previous twelve months, especially referring to the erection of the new dining room. Your Committee considered the report a highly satisfactory one.

#### MUNICIPAL BODIES.

A special appeal was made in March, 1894, to the Town Council of Geelong and to the Borough Councils of Newtown and Chilwell and Geelong West, also to the Shire Councils in the district from which patients are drawn, and was well received. Some extra donations have already been voted, and in other instances the matter is postponed until the annual vote for Charities is fixed. With regard to the Town Council of Geelong, there is no doubt that a substantial sum would have been voted, but in view of the contemplated early introduction to Parliament of a Charities Bill, it was considered well to wait until the contents of such Bill became known.

This is a step in the right direction, and helps to touch the non-charitable ratepayer, and is really anticipating the amended Charities Act which is expected to be passed this session of Parliament, by which the support of the charitable institution will be thrown very largely upon the municipal bodies of the district.

#### Re NEW HOSPITAL.

This matter, though still in abeyance, is by no means dead nor has your Committee been idle during the past year.

Steps were taken which resulted in the gazetting in November, 1893, of the land between Little Ryrie-street and Myers-street, to the south-west of the Hospital, comprising about  $1\frac{1}{2}$  acres, as a reserve for Hospital and Benevolen Asylum purposes.

The Town Council of Geelong was then approached, with a view to obtaining permission to close that part of Little Ryrie-street which runs south of the Hospital and join Bellarine-street and Swanston-street.

The permission has not yet been obtained, and your Com mittee is now waiting to see how events may turn out before wedding itself to the present site by the erection of new buildings which would cost some thousands of pounds, and might subsequently have to be abandoned. Before the publication of another annual Report it is sincerely to be hoped that some definite scheme may have been decided upon.

#### REPORTS OF MONTHLY VISITORS FOR THE YEAR.

JULY 12th, 1893.

Messrs. J. H. Connor and Charles Shannon, the visitors for the month of June, reported that they had inspected the Institution and found everything in a very satisfactory state.

August 9th, 1893.

The Rev. J. H. Toms reported that, in company with the President, he made the monthly visit, and found everything in excellent order.

SEPTEMBER 13th, 1893.

The Rev. Canon Goodman reported that, in company with Mr. H. T. Howard, he had visited the Hospital and Benevolent Asylum within the past month, and though they tried hard to discover something to complain of, they were not successful. Mr. Howard endorsed his colleague's remarks.

OCTOBER 11th, 1893.

Mr. J. Vines reported that, with Mr. Martin, he had visited the Hospital at the end of September, and although they sought for complaints and suggestions they found that there was no cause for complaint. Everything was in first-class order, although they thought that in some parts of the buildings a little more paint was required to preserve the woodwork. The Secretary stated that one of the patients had been constantly engaged in painting work for twenty months, but there was enough of that kind of work required to keep three men employed. The President jocularly remarked that it was quite evident they wanted more patient painters. Mr. Martin endorsed the report of Mr. Vines, and added that the aged gardener, who attended to the garden, was deserving of special praise.

NOVEMBER 8th, 1893.

Mr. W. W. Bradley reported that, in conjunction with the Rev. A. Davidson, he had made an inspection of the Hospital and Benevolent Asylum during the month, and it was with great pleasure that he had to report a very satisfactory condition of the internal arrangements of the Institution. All of the patients when

interviewed seemed to be unanimous in their desire to express their thanks to the Superintendent (Mr. A. Hopkins) and the Resident Surgeon (Dr. T. J. M. Kennedy) for the kindness they have shown in the management of the Hospital and Benevolent Asylum.

DECEMBER, 1893-No Report.

JANUARY 10th, 1894.

The Rev. A. W. Webb and Mr. Charles Shannon, the visitors for the month just expired, furnished a satisfactory report on their visit to the Hospital and Infirmary.

FEBRUARY 14th, 1894.

Mr. James Munday, one of the visitors for the past month, reported that upon two or three occasions he had inspected the Hospital and Benevolent Asylum, and found everything in satisfactory order.

MARCH 14th, 1894.

The Rev. J. H. Toms reported that, in company with the President, the Hospital and Benevolent Asylum were visited on the 8th inst. at the dinner hour, when everything was found in excellent order. The decided advantage of the new dining hall was apparent, and the wards were all the sweeter and the tidier for the change. The inmates all expressed the greatest contentment. A few slight repairs were found to be needed. The President bore out the report, and said that a person could not believe the improvement the new dining room had caused, unless an inspection was made. Mr. Nicol said the House Committee had attended to the repairs.

APRIL 11th, 1894.

The Rev. Canon Goodman reported having visited the Institution, where everything was in a most satisfactory state. There was harmony existing between the inmates and officials, and the wards were much cleaner owing to the use of the new separate dining rooms. The asphalt channels on the eastern side of the yard were much broken. Mr. Howard endorsed the Rev. gentleman's report, and suggested that the western side of the new dining room should be asphalted, a railing erected on each side of the stone steps at the new dining room door, and a light placed over the locality

at night time. On the motion of the Rev. A. W. Webb the suggestions of Mr. Howard were adopted, and ordered to be recommended to the House Committee.

May 9th, 1894.

Mr. Martin stated that with Mr. Vines he had visited and inspected the Institution since the previous meeting, and had found everything in a satisfactory state and the whole place scrupulously clean. He had spoken to many of the patients, and all expressed gratitude to the staff of officers and nurses for their kindness to them, and the state of the Institution reflected credit upon the officers.

Tune 13th, 1894.

The Rev. A. Davidson reported that, with Mr. Bradley, he had visited the Institution about a fortnight since, and made a thorough inspection of the buildings and premises. They found the place in much the same order as referred to in the report of the Inspector of Charities: everything was in a very satisfactory condition, and they were unable to offer any suggestions for further improvements. They found a very considerable amount of appreciation by the patients with whom they conversed in respect to the attention, care, and kindness shown them by all the officials, and there was a remarkable air of comfort and cleanliness in the various The matron's store room was in an excellent state, and to a business man about to take stock it would be found most gratifying, everything being in its place, and the books well and accurately kept. The same had to be said regarding the House Steward's work in the dispensing of medicine and food. All of these matters showed that there had been good superintendence, and justified them in supporting the motion for the increase of the Secretary's salary. Mr. Bradley endorsed every word the Rev. gentleman had said.

#### ENTERTAINMENTS.

Since our last Report was published, several entertainments have been given in aid of the funds of the Institution.

Mr. H. Meakin, in conjunction with Mr. B. W. Wheatland, got up a concert to celebrate the opening of the New Dining Rooms in the Benevolent Asylum; and this, besides being a musical success, resulted in a gain of £7 17s. to the Hospital funds.

The Victorian Police Band, that has done so much to assist the charities in different parts of the colony, paid a visit to Geelong in February, and gave a performance in Johnstone Park, which realised £18 2s. 8d.—a very handsome amount.

Other entertainments, held in up-country towns—such as concerts and subscription balls—have been productive of profit, and to the promoters of these the thanks of your Committee are tendered.

The respective amounts received will be found on another page.

COLLECTIONS IN STATE SCHOOLS.

For the second time the requisite permission was given by the hon, the Minister of Education to make an appeal on Hospital Saturday to the children attending the State Schools. This did not yield quite so much as the previous year, when £26 1s. 10d. was received; but this is abundantly accounted for by the existing depression and scarcity of employment. The effort will, however, be persisted in, and will doubtless in the future prove a valuable source of income.

#### TYPHOID FEVER TENTS.

The two tents for reception of typhoid fever patients proved of great service during the past summer, when they were in use for over four months.

Thirty-nine cases were treated, of which four terminated fatally.

The patients are found to do better in tents than in wards, as they can be kept cooler, more especially at night.

These tents were erected in 1890, and the canvas will need partially renewing next season.

#### BENEVOLENT ASYLUM.

The past year has been made a red letter one by the building and opening the large new Dining Rooms for the inmates of the Benevolent Asylum. These have been very much needed, as previously the old people had all their food served in the sleeping wards, and also had no other place to sit during the day.

The rooms are built of <u>brick</u>, with <u>kauri ceilings and floors</u>, and are very spacious—that for the <u>men</u> being 50ft. x 30ft., and for the <u>women</u> 25ft. x 30ft.

These are furnished with kauri dining tables and reversible backed seats.

The main dining hall is well adapted for concerts, &c., and several have been held in it since it was built.

The large benevolent Asylum wards, Nos. 9 and 11, now not being used for meals, the old dining tables have been removed, thereby giving room for the introduction of 20 more beds, 10 for men and an equal number for women.

We can now accommodate 88 men and 39 women. Total 127.

With the increased accommodation, however, comes an increased need of support, and to maintain the extra 20 beds we shall require an additional sum of about £250 annually.

#### STAFF.

No change has occurred in the officers of the Institution during the past three years.

Your Committee begs especially to again express its extreme satisfaction with the continued efforts of the Superintendent and Matron in furthering the interests of the Institution, and also with the able and painstaking attention to his duties on the part of the Resident Surgeon.

Some changes have been made during the year amongst nurses, wardsmen, and house servants, but nothing worthy of note; and the staff as a whole has worked well in the interests of the Institution, and given satisfaction to your Committee.

During the typhoid season, which was more severe than for several years, extra nursing assistance had to be provided, which entailed considerable expense.

#### CHRISTMAS TREAT.

Through the kindness of the public, Christmas at the Hospital, 1893, was made as enjoyable as it was possible to make it.

The appeal for gifts in money or kind was generously responded to, and the dinner provided was all that the most fastidious could desire.

The new Dining Room was used for the first time in that capacity, and was tastefully decorated with flags kindly lent by Messrs. McGregor and Buchanan, and pot plants and cut

flowers obtained from the Eastern Gardens, by permission of His Worship the Mayor (J. H. Grey, Esq.) who attended with the Mayoress, and addressed a few kind words to the old people before they sat down to dinner.

On behalf of the old people, the Committee begs to thank the public for enabling it to make Christmas, which comes but once a year, a time of exceptional pleasure to the inmates of the Institution.

#### HONORARY MEDICAL STAFF.

Dr. Small applied for and obtained leave of absence from August 1893 until March 1894, to make a trip to Europe. On his return he made a report to your Committee on some hospitals visited, which may prove of service when a new Hospital is about to be proceeded with. In his absence Dr. Croker filled the vacancy.

To these gentlemen and the rest of the Honorary Medical Staff the thanks of your Committee are tendered, on behalf of the Subscribers, for their constant attendance on the patients.

According to the Bye-Laws, Drs. Hope, Newman, Marwood and Small now retire, but are eligible for re-election.

#### VOTES OF THANKS:

The Geelong Flower Mission, under the direction of Mrs. Hitchcock, has again visited the Hospital each Wednesday morning; and even when flowers were scarcest, has always managed to bring a bouquet for every inmate of the Institution, accompanied by a text of scripture. These visits are much appreciated, and who can tell the good they do!

Your Committee again begs to thank Mrs. Hitchcock and her able band of workers for their indefatigableness in continuing this work from year to year.

The Proprietors of the "Argus," "Age," "Ballarat Star," "Geelong Advertiser," and "Geelong Times," have continued to supply their papers during the year, and the hearty thanks of your Committee are accorded to them for their kindness.

The thanks of your Committee are tendered to all those who have during the past year tried to amuse the inmates and patients of the Institution.

Madame Antoinette Stirling, the famous contralto, paid a visit to the Hospital in August 1893, and sang several ballads and hymns which were much appreciated.

The <u>Choirs</u> of Fenwick-street Baptist Church, the United Methodists of West Geelong, and the Y.W.C.A., gave concerts, the last mentioned every three months, which were much enjoyed.

Magic Lantern entertainments were given by the Rev. G. N. McDonnell (late of Christ Church) and also the Gordon College Amateur Photographic Club, and these were particularly interesting to the old people.

Conjuring exhibitions were given by Professor Leighton and Professor Renier, who were visiting the town, and caused much laughter and amusement.

The daughter of the latter, "Little Lilian," also astonished the old bushmen by her really wonderful shooting with a repeating rifle.

The Carnival Minstrels have again this year, on more than one occasion, given an evening's pleasure to the old people.

# SUBSCRIBERS' POWERS AS TO ADMISSION OF PATIENTS.

Your Committee would call attention to By-Laws 6 and 7 re the admission of patients to the Hospital.

It will be seen that Governors and Contributors have a right to recommend a person for admission, but this must be viewed in conjunction with Bye-Law 61, and Subscribers must not feel offended if the cases recommended by them are not admitted. To admit cases indiscriminately must be a most unwise practice; and full discretion must be left to the Resident Surgeon as to whether the case is one which needs admission.

#### COMMITTEES.

During the past year 14 meetings of the General Committee, 51 of the House Committee, and 12 of the Finance Committee, have been held.

A table is appended showing the attendances at these meetings, which will prove to the subscribers that their representatives attend well to their duties.

The House Committee has again been only appointed for six months at a time, and this arrangement seems to work well. The members of that Committee deserve the thanks of the Subscribers for their close attention to the business of the Institution in all its details.

During the year four members of the General Committee lost their seats through non-attendance, viz., Dr. Small, owing to absence in Europe; the late Mr. James Strong, through illness; and Messrs. W. Humble and W. Reid, through pressure of business engagements.

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### EXTRACTS FROM BYE-LAWS.



#### OBJECTS.

Bye-Law No. 2.

That the objects of the Infirmary be to afford medical and surgical aid to poor persons requiring it; to a limited number of paying patients whose admission, under special circumstances, may be sanctioned by the Committee of Management; and for casualties; but no person who shall meet with casualties and shall be found able to pay for surgical aid shall receive further than temporary assistance. That the objects of the Benevolent Asylum be the reception of the poor and distressed, with a view to afford them consolation and assistance.

#### APPROPRIATION OF BUILDINGS.

Bye-Law No. 3.

That a portion of one of the buildings shall be set apart for the purpose of an Infirmary, and a portion for the purpose of the Benevolent Asylum, at the discretion of the Committee, who shall also be empowered to permit the reception of Lunatics on remand for medical examination in a ward erected for that purpose.

#### CONSTITUTION.

Bye-Law No. 4.

The Corporation shall consist of a President, two Vice-Presidents, Treasurer, Governors and Contributors.

## QUALIFICATION, DESIGNATION AND PRIVILEGES OF BENEFACTORS.

Bye-Law No. 5.

The following shall be the qualification, designation, and privileges of Governors, Contributors, and Honorary Collectors, viz.:—

£50 personal contribution in one year—Life Governor. £20 ... Life Subscriber.

#250 ,, 250 Bequest, under will first named, or acting executor (bequest under will) under such will.

£20 society, association, or company collecting or paying in one year (to nominate for each £20 collected or paid).

£1 and upwards, Minister of Church or Honorary Layman collecting in one year. Collector.

Provided always that no minister, congregation, association, society, company, or person shall nominate as a contributor or contributors any person or persons, the yearly subscription or subscriptions for whom shall be sought or intended to be paid out of moneys derived from a public or private collection for Charitable purposes. Every firm or partnership subscribing may exercise their privileges through one of themselves to be nominated in writing by such firm, and the Trustees or Executors of every Estate subscribing may exercise their privileges through one of themselves to be nominated in writing by such Trustees or Executors, and every Public or Corporate Body subscribing may exercise their privileges through some person in their employ to be nominated in writing by such Public or Corporate Body. The power of voting by nominees at Annual or Special Meeting being limited to three votes for all they represent.

Bye-Law No. 6.

Life Governors will be entitled to recommend—
1 In and 4 Out-Patients (always on the books).

Life Subscriber—

1 In and 2 Out-Patients annually.

Governor for 1 year-

10 In and 20 Out-Patients.

Contributor-

1 In and 2 Out-Patients annually for each £1 subscribed.

Honorary Collector-

1 in and 2 Out-Patients annually for each £1 collected.

Bye-Law No. 7.

Recommendation shall be made by ticket, and shall be only used for the recommendation of persons unable to pay for medical attendance; the reception of such persons shall be subject to the approval of the Committee of Management, and provided that the funds and the accommodation of the Institution admit of their reception. When recommendations cannot be acceded to, a ticket in lien of that used shall be returned to the Subscriber. Tickets will be issued by the Secretary to Subscribers at the time of payment of subscriptions. Subscribers shall also have the privilege at any time, on application to the Secretary, of exchanging Out-Patients for In-Patients; and vice versa, one In-Patient's ticket being equivalent to three Out-Patients'.

Bye-Law No. 8.

Subscribers of £1 and upwards shall have full power to vote at all meetings from time of payment, and shall be deemed Annual Subscribers from date of payment.

Bye-Law No. 9.

At all Annual and Special Meetings of the Corporation, Life Governors shall have three votes; Life Subscribers and Annual Governors two votes; Annual Contributors of £5 58 and upwards three votes; £3 3s. two votes; £1 one vote; Honorary Collectors for whole amount collected in one year one vote.

#### GENERAL MEETINGS.

Bye-Law No. 12.

An Annual Meeting of the Contributors shall be held on the last Thursday in the month of July in every year for the following purposes:—

(1). To receive the Report of the Committee of Management and audited statement of receipts and expenditure for the

year to 30th June, preceding.

(2). For the election of President, Vice-Presidents, and Treasurer, Honorary Medical Staff, and Auditors for the ensuing year.

(3). The election of Members of the Committee of Manage-

ment to fill vacancies.

(4). For the transaction of any business of which notice has been given, or that may arise at such meeting connected with the Institution.

Bye-Law No. 13.

If required by the Committee of Management, or upon the requisition in writing of six members of the Committee, or of ten Contributors, the Secretary shall without delay convene a special meeting of Contributors, the occasion of calling such meeting being stated in such requisition; and no business shall be transacted at such special meeting except that for which it shall have been summoned.

Bye-Law No. 14.

All meetings of Contributors shall be called by the Secretary by advertisement in one or more newspapers published in Geelong, for at least one week previous to such meeting.

Bye-Law No. 15.

At all meetings of Contributors, the President, or in his absence one of the Vice-Presidents, shall take the chair; but in their absence the meeting shall choose its own chairman, who shall have a casting vote only.

Bye-Law No. 16.

Ten Contributors entitled to vote shall constitute a quorum at all meetings of Contributors, and as soon as a quorum be present the chair shall be taken; but if no quorum is present within half-an-hour of the time named, such meeting shall stand adjourned for the following week at the same day and hour.

Bye-Law No. 17.

Every question submitted to a General Meeting, and all elections, shall be decided by a majority of votes of Governors and Contributors present entitled to vote, and shall be taken by a show of hands, unless a ballot shall have been previously demanded by any three persons entitled to vote, in which case the voting shall be by ballot, and for such purpose scrutineers shall be appointed before the ballot is taken; and such elections by ballot shall be held on such day and such place as the Committee shall have determined, and shall have notified by advertisement in one or more newspapers published in Geelong three clear days before the said general meeting; and at such ballot all Governors and Contributors, who are entitled to and desire to vote, shall attend in their proper persons; and the poll shall be kept open from three o'clock p.m. to eight o'clock p.m., and the Committee shall make provision for the orderly conduct of such election, and for the proper counting of the votes, and the publication of the result.

## ADMISSION OF PATIENTS INTO THE INFIRMARY.

Bye-Law No. 58,

Accidents and such cases of decided emergency only as in the opinion of the Resident Surgeon cannot be delayed may be received in the Infirmary at any time without ticket; and the admission of patients, in ordinary cases recommended by Subscribers' tickets, shall be daily (Sundays excepted) between the hours of nine and twelve o'clock in the forenoon, by the Secretary and the Honorary Medical Staff for the week, or in the absence of such staff, by the Secretary and Resident Surgeon; such admission to be temporary, and subject to the approval of the House Committee at its next meeting.

### ADMISSION OF PAYING PATIENTS.

Bye-Law No. 59.

Paying patients may be admitted at the discretion of the House Committee, who shall fix the weekly rate to be charged to each patient, and in the event of an operation being necessary may fix a fee therefor, and may require the same to be paid in advance; and every person admitted on the ground of emergency to the benefits of the Institution, and able, in the estimation of the Committee, to pay, shall be required to do so at such rate as the Committee may determine. Each admission of a paying patient shall be reported to the General Committee at its next meeting, and shall be subject to confirmation.

Bye-Law No. 60.

The General Rules and Regulations of the Institution shall be applicable to, and be observed by all paying patients.

#### PERSONS NOT ADMISSIBLE.

Bve-Law No 61.

No pregnant female for the purpose of confinement; no insane person, except on remand for medical examination in the Lunatic Ward; no one having a contagious or infectious disease; no one subject to epilepsy; nor any one, who, in the opinion of the Honorary Medical Staff for the week, or the Hesident Surgeon, might receive equal benefit as an out patient, shall be admitted; and no child under five years of age shall be admitted, except in cases of accidents or for a surgical operation; nor except under special circumstances shall patients be admitted from other districts where Hospitals exist; provided that the House Committee or Officers of the Institution shall have discretionary power to admit such prohibited cases, and shall report upon the exercise of such power to the next general meeting of the Committee of Management.

## ADMISSION OF INMATES INTO THE BENEVOLENT ASYLUM.

Bye-Law No. 62.

The admission of inmates into the Benevolent Asylum shall be restricted to those days in each week upon which the House Committee meets, when applications shall be considered and decided upon. No pregnant female for the purpose of confinement; no person insane; no child under twelve years of age; no one having a contagious or infectious disease, shall be admitted

#### RULES FOR VISITORS.

- 1.—Visitors shall be admitted into the Institution on Sunday and Thursday in each week, between the hours of two and four in the afternoon, but no visitor shall be allowed to remain more than one hour. Not more than two visitors will be allowed to see any patient at the same time, except on special occasions, and by leave of the Resident Surgeon or Superintendent.
- 2.—Visitors may be admitted on special occasions by the Resident Surgeon or Superintendent, or by a written order from a member of the House Committee.
- 3.—Visitors shall not be allowed to enter any ward without the leave of the Resident Surgeon or Superintendent, and every visitor shall retire when requested.
- 4.—They shall not be permitted to give to or to leave with any patient any medicines, food or liquor of any kind without the express leave of the Resident Surgeon or Superintendent.
- 5.—No visitor shall give to any servant of the Institution any money or gratuity of any kind.
- 6.—Visitors shall not interfere with the Wardsmen or Nurses, or disturb the patients by loud talking or unnecessary noise.

- 7.—No male visitor shall visit a female ward without the leave of the Resident Surgeon or Superintendent, and then shall not enter the ward without the Nurse in charge being first informed.
- 8.—Any visitor violating any of the Regulations of the Institution, or behaving with impropriety, shall be compelled to retire, and will not be re-admitted without special leave from the Resident Surgeon or Superintendent.

#### MINISTERS OF RELIGION, &c.

Any Minister of Religion or Religious Instructor shall have access to the patients of their respective denominations at all reasonable times when not objected to by such patients or the Medical Staff.

Ministers and others performing religious services at the bedside of any patient, shall do so in such a manner as to be as little

overheard as possible by the surrounding patients.
