## INCOME AND EXPENDITURE.

The receipts for maintenance during the year were $£ 5170^{\circ} 9$ s. 2d, including £ $£ 00$ donated by Mrs. Silas Harding, for the filtings of the neryly erected Bowen Wards.

The total expenditure, under the heading of maintenance, was $£ 5569 \mathrm{ls}$. Thus the year's income for this purpose falls short of the expenditure by $£ 398$ 11s. 10 d .

The expenditure, under the heading of building, was $£ 2673$ Is, and towards this outlay $£ 2000$ was transferred. from the reserve fund.

The Bank Overdraft on 30th June, 1896, was $£ 1601$ 3s. 2d., being an increase of $£ 107112 \mathrm{~s} .10 \mathrm{~d}$. on the overdraft of June 30 th, 1895 . This is accounted for by the $£ 675 \mathrm{ls}$, expended on building, and the $£ 398$ 11s. 10 d. shortage in the amount received for general maintenance. The shortage the previous year was $£ 2118 \mathrm{~s} 7 \mathrm{~d}$.

The sum paid for interest on the Bank overdraft is faroutweighed by the substantial improvements which havebeen made during the past year.

## ENDOWMENT AND RESERVE FUND.

The amount to the credit of this fund has been, ass already stated, decreased by $£ 2000$, and now stands at £4554 0s. 11d.

Through the death of Mrs. Thomson of Keilambete, a sum of $£ 8000$ to $£ 10,000$ will be received in the course of 1897 for special investment for Endowment purposes.

Annual average cost, $£ 32$ 2s. 5 d. per head.
This is 18 s . 1d. per head more than the previous year, and is accounted for in the following two ways:-First, Whilst the Hospital was being re-floored, one of the wards, which would accommodate about 15 patients, had always to be lept out of use. Thus the daily average of InPatients is about 15 less than it otherwise would have been; and the average cost per head is proportionately greater, as the expenses of administration during the same time could not be lessened. The second reason for the increased cost per head is, the rise in the price of bread and some other commodities.

## OHARGE FOR DRUGS TO OUT-PATIENTS.

This is still continued and is not found to be oppresiive. The oharge is 6d. per time for all the medicines then supplied.

The foregoing list speaks eloquently for itself, and proves that your Committee has been keenly alive to the necessity of bringing your Institution up to date, and making it worthy of the important town and district to which it belongs. It is generally admitted that it now compares favorably with any other similar establishment in the culony.

## INSPEOTOR OF OHARITIES' REPORT.

Mr. W. G. Brett visited on 2nd June, 1896, and expressed himself as being very pleased with the improvements effected since his previous visit.

The following are extracts from is Report to the Hon. the Treasurer of Victoria, viz. : -
"The improvements that have been carried out are all along the line, the internal as well as the external arrangements increased in efficiency and usefulness, which conduce to raise the Institution to a higher standard than it has hitherto attained,

The most important of these may be mentioned, namely, reflooring wards, balconies, and repairs to portico, papering and painting, two extra nurses, 20 more beds for Benevolent Asylum inmates, steam boiler to replace the old one, cocoa nut matting replaced by linoleum

The new operating room and wards attached to it, the outpationts department, nurses quarters, and laundry extensions are all in the right direction, and with other works too numerous to specify deserve recognition and favorable comment.

It is encouraging to find so marked an improvement in this important Institution and the efficiency of which will, I hope, be always well maintained."

## NEW BUILDINGS.

During the year under review, a new building, on the most modern and scifntific principles, has been erected, facing Ryrie Street, on the east block, for the reception and treatment of Out-Patients only. This was opened in April. 1896, and has been found to be a great improvement on the old system.

## TRAINING SCHOOL FOR NURSES.

For some time past your Committee has Leen anxious to establish a Training School for Nurses.

Through the liberality of Mrs. Silas Harding, late of Geelong, but now of Toorals, who has generously promised $£ 400$ for its erection, it has been able to build a handsome "Home" to accommodate eight Trainees. This will shortly be ready for occupation, and thus the Nursing School be an established fact.

## BENEVOLENT ASYLUM.

In spite of the number of beds being increased from 107 to 127 , cases, though urgent, have constantly to be refused admission. : Your Committee would point out to Subscribers that the beds once being filled, new cases must be refused pending vacancies occurring.

The Government Bill-so long promised-to amend the present Oharities Act, may remedy the evils of the existing system.

## REPORT OF MONTHLY VISITORS FOR THE YEAR.

Johy 11th, 1895.
Mr. Geo. Martin reported, that in conjunction with the President, he had inspected the Institution daring the month, and they found the place in sueh a satisfactory and cleanly condition as to reffect credit on the officers and all concerned in the internal managemeut of the Inslitution. The President endorsed the remarks of Mr. Martin. In discussing the report, it was mentioned that there was need for the present worn-ont freestone steps at the entrance being replaced by blue stone, and the President intimated that it would be brought under the notice of the incoming Committee.

Adgust 15th, 1895.
The Rev. Canon Goodman read a report referring to a visit to the Institution made by himself and Mr. Vines, and recomending a number of minor repairs and improvements. Reference was also made to the cleanliness and general satisfactory state of the Institution. They were much pleased with the new garden beds laid round the new operating Wards. The report was referred to the Honse Committee for consideration.

Septramber 12th, 1895.
Mr. Coulston reported that, with Mr. H, Blomfield Brown, he had visited the Institution since the previons meating. They had made a thorough inspection of the whole place, and found everything very clean and in admirable order throughout. Ther had noticed that very great improvements had been effected in the floors of the wards and the balconies outside. All of the patients in the Hospital and Asylum had been spolken to, and not one of them had a word of complaint to make, and all of them appeared; to be perfectly satisfied. It was very
rough and rainy weather when they visited the quarters of the patients in the Benevolent Wards, and the patients, who were outside, had every means provided them for enjoying themselves in the large shelter shed. With Mr. Brown, he regretted very much that in Geelong they had not greater accommodation for the old men and old women to quietly pass away their declining years. It was a great pity that many of the unfortnnate aged people, who were repeatedly brought before the police court on charges of vagrancy, could not be given shelter in the Asylam instead of being sent to gaol merely on account of poverty and infirmity, He had almost daily experience of persons coming before the courts, who had no place to lay their heads nor meals to gratify their hunger, and who for no other reason had to be sent to gaol to herd with people, who had grown old and poor in a life of crime. It was abont time that some action was taken to put an end to that cause of complaint, and he thonght it might well be considered a matter worthy of the special attention of the Committee and all charitably disposed persons. It was due to the General Committee and the officers to say that the aatisfactory state of affairs at the Geelong Hospital was in a great measure the result of their watchfulness. Mr. H. B. Brown, as one of the visitors, endorsed all that Mr. Coulston had said.

October 10th, 1895.
Mr. Bradley reported that, in company with the Hon. J. H. Connor, he had inspected the Institution during, last month, and found everything in a thoroughly satisfactory condition.

November 14th, 1895.
Mr. Jas. Munday reported that although he had visited the Institution during the past month, he had not been able to inspect the buildings, etc., in con-
junction with the Rev. A. Davidson, the other official visitor. However, from what he say be was convinced that the laying down of the new floor was a great improvement, and the whole of the internal arrangements were found to be in satisfactory order.

Dioember 12th, 1895.
Dr. Small made a verbal report on his inspection of the Institution during the past month, and he spoke very distinctly of the satisfactory manner in which the internal arrangements were being carried out by the superintendent, the matron, and the other officials. He, however, pointed out that the corridors required renovating to harmonise with the other alterations that have of late been effected at the Institution. From the Rev. J. Cowperthwaite, the other visitor, a letter was also received similar to the statement made by Dr. Small, and it was decided to refer the question of repairs to the Honse Committee.

January 9th, 1896.
The Rev. A. W. Webb and Mr. Chas. Shannon, the official visitors for the past month, forwarded an entirely satisfactory report of their inspection. They, however, recommended that a verandah be erected on the west side of the Bowen operating theatre, to minimise the great heat experienced there in the summer. Dr. Small said that he did not think that there was any necessity for it, because the operating room was only occasionally used, and then for about an hour at a time. No action was taken.

Marce 12th, 1896.
The President, one of the official visitors appointed for the previons month, expressed his regret that another engagement prevented his attendance at the preceeding meeting of the General Committee. When
he visited the premises he pointed out that the asphalting of the men's smoking shed was in need of repair, and that had since been attended to. A useful improvement had been effected in the Nightingale Ward for women, by the insertion of two windows on the west side of the apartment, thus giving extra light, and of conrse increased ventilation. He asked the Committee to sanction the expenditure of an additional sum for the still further improvement of the buildings. He suggested that the Nurses bedroom leading from No. (11) Ward be altered by building up the present door; and that a window be placed in the east end of the room, and that the lavatory and sink at the present entrance be abolished. The lavatory and sink could be more conveniently constructed in connection with the present bathroom, and the cost for the whole of the alterations he was given to understand would not exceed $£ 60$. The President alsn suggested that the battened footway between No. 2 and No. 11 Wards should be taleen away aud replaced by asphalt. He moved that the House Committee be dixected to obtain tenders for the work when advertising for tenders in connection with the new laundry. The motion was duly seconded and carried.

April 9th, 1896.
The Rev, Canon Goodman reported that he had visited the Institution during the past month in company with Mr. George Martin, and they found everything in very creditable order, and the patients all expressed themselves as thoroughly satisfied with their treatment. The reverend gentleman sugggested that an improvement might be effected in the cooking appliances in the kitchẹn, and the proposition was referred to the Honse Committee for coisideration. Mr. Geo. Martin endorsed the remarks of the Rev, Canon Goodman.

May 14th, 1896.
Messrs. Joshua Vines and H. B. Brown, the visitors for last month reported that they had risited the Institution and found everything in capital order, They endeavored to find some fault or other, but were not successful in doing so. They suggested the advisability of the Committee taking into consideration the matter of eracting a substantial iron fence along the front of the Hospital. The President thought such was unnecessary, because the inmates, he felt sure, would not care about the whole of the grounds being open to inspection from the outside. The present fence was adequate for all purposes for years to come.

Mr. W. W. Bradley reported haring visited the Institution in company with Mr. J. J. Trait, and having made a thorough examination. They had no fanlt to find and no reconmendations to make. This was considered highly satisfactory.

## EXTRACTS FROM BYE-LAWS.



## OBJECTS.

Bye-Law No. 2.
That the objects of the Infirmary be to afford medical and surgioal aid to poor persons requiring it; to a limited number of paying patients whose admission, under special circumstances, may be sanctioned by the Committee of Management; and for casualties; but no person who shall meet with casualties and shall be found able to pay for surgical aid shall receive further than temporary assistance. That the objects of the Benevolent. Asylum be the reception of the poor and distressed, with a view to afford them consolation and assistance.

## APPROPRIATION OF BUILDINGS.

Bye-Law No. 3.
That a portion of one of the buildings shall be set apart for the purpose of an Infirmary, and a portion for the purpose of the Benevolent Asylnm, at the discretion of the Committee, who shall also be empowered to permit the reception of Lunatics on remand for medical examination, in a ward erected for that purpose.

## CONSTITUTION.

Hye-Law No. 4.
The Corporation shall consist of a President, two VicePresidents, Treasurer, Governors, and Contributors.

QUALIFICATION, DESIGNATION, AND PRIVILEGES OF BENEFACTORS.
Bye-Law No. 5 ,
The following shall be the qualification, designation, and privileges of Governors, Contribators, and Honorary Collectors, viz :-

Provided always that no minister, congregation, association, society, company, or person shall nominate as a contributor or contributors any person or persons, the yearly subscription or subscriptions for whom shall be sought or intended to be paid out of moneys derived from a public or private collection for Charitable purposes. Every firm or partnership subscribing may exercise their priviliges through one of themselves to be nominated in writing by such firmi; and the l'rustees or Executors of every Estate subscribing may exercise their privileges through one of themselves to be nominated in writing by such Trustees or Executors; and every Public or Corporate Body subscribing may exercise their privileges throngh some person in their employ to be nominated in writing by such Public or Corporate Body. The power of voting by nominees at Annual or Special Meeeting being limited to three votes for all they represent.

## Bye-Law No. 6.

Life Governors will be entitled to recommend-
1 ln and 4 Out Patients (almays on the books).
Life Snbscriber-
1 In and 2 Out Patients annually.
Governor for 1 year-
10 In and 20 Out Patients.
Contributor-
1 In and 2 Out Patients annually for each £1 subscribed.
Honorary Collector-
1 In and 2 Out Patients annually for each £1 collected.

Bye-Law No. 7.
Recommendation shall be made by ticket, and shall be only used for the recommendation of persons unable to pay for medical attendance; the reception of such persons shall be subject to the approval of the Committee of Management, and provided that the funds and the accommodation of the Institution admit of their reception. When recommendations cannot be acceded to, a ticket in lien of that used shall be returned to the Subscriber. Tickets will be issued by the Secretary to Subscribers at the time of payment of subscriptions. Subscribers shall also have the privilege at any time, on application to the Secretary, of exchanging (uatPatients for In -Patients, and vice versa, one In-Patient's ticket being equivalent to three Ont-Patients'.

## Bye-Law No. 8.

Subscribers of $£ 1$ and upwards shall have fall power to vote at all meetings from time of payment, and shall be deemed Annual Subscribers from date of payment

Bye-Law No. 9.
At all Annual and Special Meetings of the Corporation, Life Governors shall have three votes; Life Subscribers and Annnal Governors, two votes; Annual Contributors of $£ 55 \mathrm{~s}$, and upwards, three votes; $£ 3$ 3s., two votes; £1, one vote; Honorary Collectors, for whole amount collected in one year, one vote.

## GENERAL MEETINGS.

Bye-Law No. 12.
An Annual Meeting of the Contributors shall be held on the last Thursday in the month of July in every year, for the following purposes :-
(1.) To receive the Report of the Committee of Management, and Audited Statement of Receipts and Expenditure, for the year to 30 th June preceding.
(2.) For the Election of President, Vice-Presidents, and Treasurer, Honorary Medical Staff, and Auditors for the ensuing year.
(8.) The Election of Members of the Committee of Management to fill vacancies.
(4.) For the transaction of any business of which notice has been given, or that may arise at such meeting, connected with the Institntion.

Bye-Law No. 13.
If required by the Committee of Management, or upon the requisition in writing of six Members of the Committee, or of ten Contributors, the Secretary shall, without delay, convene a special meeting of Contributors, the occasion of calling euch meeting being stated in such requisition; and no business shall be transacted at such special meeting. except that for which it shall have been summoned.

Bye-Law No. 14.
All meetings of Contributors shall be called by the Secretary, by advertisement in one or more newspapers published in Geelong, for at least one week previous to such meeting.

Bye-Lav No. 15.
At all. Meetings of Contributors the President, or in his absence one of the Vice-Presidents, shall take the chair ; but in their absence the meeting shall choose its own chairman, who shall have a casting vote only.

Bye-Law No. 16.
Ten Contributors entitled to voite shall constitute a quorum at all meetings of Contributors, and as soon as a quorum be present the chair shall be taken; but if no quorum is present within half-an-hour of the time named such meeting shall stand adjourned for the following week, at the same day and hour.

Bye-Law No. 17.

Every question submitted to a General Meeting, and all elections, shall be decided by a majority of votes of Governors and Contribntors present entitled to vote, and shall be taken by a show of hands, unless a ballot shall have been previously demanded by any three persons entitled to vote, in which case the voting shall be by ballot, and for such purpose scrutineers shall be appointed before the ballot is taken; and such elections by ballot shall be held on such day and such place as the Committee shall have determined, and shall have notified by advertisement in one or more newspapers published in Geelong three clear days before the said

General Meeting; and at such ballot all Governors and Contributors, who are entitled to and desire to vote, shall attend in their proper persons ; and the poll shall be kept open from three o'clook p.m. to eight o'clock p.m., and the Committee shall make provision for the orderly conduct of such election, and for the proper counting of the votes, and the publication of the result.

## ADMISSTON OF PATIENTS INTO THE INFIRMARY.

Bye-Law No. 58.
Accidents, and such cases of decided emergenoy only as in the opinion of the Resident Surgeon cannot be delayed, may be received in the Infirmary at any time without ticket; and the admission of patients, in ordinary cases recommended by Subscribers' tickets, shall be daily (Sundays excepted) between the hours of nine and twelve o'clock in the forenoon, by the Secretary and the Honorary Medical Staff for the week, or in the absence of such staff, by the Secretary and Resident Surgeon; such admission to be temporary, and subjeot to the approval of the House Committee at its next meeting.

## ADMISSION OF PAYING PATIENTS.

Bye-Law No. 69.
Paying patients may be admitted at the discretion of the Honse Committee, who shall fix the weekly rate to be charged to each patient, and in the event of an operation being necessary may fix a fee therefor, and may require the same to be paid in advance; and every person admitted on the ground of emergency to the benefits of the Institation, and able, in the estimation of the Committee, to pay, shall be required to do so at such rate as the Committee may determine. Each admission of a paring patient shall be reported to the General Committee at its next meeting; and shall be subject to confirmation.

Bye-Law No. 60.
The General Rules and Regulations of the Institution shall be applicable to, and be observed by all paying patients,

## PERSONS NOT ADMISSIBLE.

Bye-Law No. 61,
No pregnant female for the purpose of confinement; no insane person, except on remand for medical examination in the Lunacy Ward; no one having a contagious or infectious disease; no one subject to epilepsy; nor any one who, in the opinion of the Honorary Medical Staff for the week, or the Resident Surgeon, might recoive equal benefit as an out-patient, shall be admitted; and no child under five years of age shall be admitted, except in cases of accidents or for a surgical operation; nor, except under special circumstances, shall patients be admitted from other districts where Hospitals exist; provided that the House Committee or Officers of the Institution shall have diseretionary power to admit such prohibited cases, and shall report upon the exercise of such power to the next General Meeting of the Committee of Management.

## ADMISSION OF INMATES INTU THE BENEVOLENT ASYLUM.

Bye-Law No. 62.
The admission of inmates into the Benevolent Asylum shall be restricted to those days in each week upon which the House Committee meets, when applications shall be considered and decided upon. No pregnant female for the purpose of confinement; no person insane; no child under twelve years of age; no person having a contagious or infectious disease, shall be admilted.

## RULES FOR VISITORS.

1.-Visitors shall be admitted into the Institution on Sunday and Thursday in each week, between the hours of two and four in the afternoon, but no visitor shall be allowed to remain more than one hour. No more than two visitors will be allowed to see any patient at the same time, except on special occasions, and by leare of the Resident Surgeon or Superintendent.
2.-Visitors may be admitted on special occasions by the Resident Surgeon or Superintendent, or by a written order from a member of the House Committee.
3.- Visitors shall not be allowed to enter any ward without the leave of the Resident Surgeon or Superintendent, and every visitor shall retire when requasted.
4.-They shall not be permitted to give to or leave with any patient any medicines, food, or liquor of any kind without the express leave of the Resident Surgeon or Superintendent,
5.-No visitor shall give to any servant of the Institution any money or gratuity of any kind.
6.-Visitors shall not interfere with the Wardsmen or Nurses, or disturb the patients by loud talking or unnecessary noise.
7.-No male visitor shall visit a female ward without the leave of the Resident Surgeon or Superintendent, and then shall not enter the ward without the nurse in charge being first informed.
8.-Any visitor violating any of the Regulations of the Institution, or beharing with impropriety, shall be compelled to retire, and will not be re-admitted without special leave from the Resident Surgeon or Superintendent.

MINISTERS OF RELIGION, \&G.
Any Minister of Religion or Religious Instructor shall have access to the patients of their respective denominations at all reasonable times, when not objected to by such patients or the Medical Staff.

Ministers and others performing religious services at the bedside of any patient, shall do so in such a manner as to be as little overheard as possible by the surrounding patients.
