TO THE GOVERNORS AND SUBSCRIBERS.

As those who have had the honor of being entrusted by you with the management of this large and growing Institution, we have now the pleasure of rendering you an account of our stewardship for the year which ended on the 30th June, 1897.

The daily average in the House has been 167.4.

The average rate of mortality has been 10.09 per cent. for all cases, and 9.06 per cent. for Hospital In-door Patients.

This is a very low death rate for a General Hospital, and in the absence of proper accommodation for the isolation of infectious and septic cases speaks volumes for the skill of the Medical Staff, and the general administration of the Institution.

The total number remaining in the House on the 30th June, 1897, was 193.

#### INCOME AND EXPENDITURE.

The receipts for maintenance during the year were  $\pounds 5178$  11s. 5d., and the total expenditure under this heading was  $\pounds 6174$  2s. 9d. There was therefore the sum of  $\pounds 995$  11s. 4d. required to make ends meet.

Under the heading of Building, £1848 5s. 3d. was paid, and towards this amount £500 was received from the late Mrs. Silas Harding.

The Bank Overdraft on 30th June, 1896, was £1601 3s.2d., and when the present year ended on June 30th, 1897, this had been, owing to building operations and the deficit on the general maintenance account, increased to £3444 19s. 9d.

It was then determined by your Committee at its July Meeting to transfer the sum of £3000 from the Reserve Fund to the General Account, thereby reducing the Bank Overdraft to £444 19s. 9d.

As the improvements which were necessary to bring the Hospital up to date have now been almost entirely effected, it is hoped that in future the income will prove sufficient to meet the expenditure.

# ENDOWMENT AND RESERVE FUND.

The amount to the credit of this Fund is, after transfer of the £3000 previously mentioned, £1554 11s.

As mentioned in the last Report, through the death of Mrs Jno. Thomson, of Keilambete, a sum of  $\pounds$ 8000 to  $\pounds$ 10000 will ultimately be received. Pending the sale of the property, the rents received are being divided *pro rata* amongst the beneficiaries under the will, and your Institution received as its proportion for the past year the sum of £213 10s. 5d.

#### Daily Average 167.4 In-door Patients.

Annual average cost, £35 4s. 2d. per head. This is £3 1s. 9d. per head more than last year, and is to be accounted for partly on the ground of increased cost of various commodities: e.g. bread has gone up from £192 7s. 6d. to £320 9s. 9d., and partly owing to the establishment of the Nurses' Training School which must cost the Institution at least £250 per annum.

In return for this latter item, the public eventually gain by being able to secure the services of Trained Nurses.

In connection with this it must be understood that had the Training School not been established, it would have been necessary, owing to the additional wards and facilities for treatment provided in your Institution, to have engaged extra "Trained Nurses at the full rate of pay usually paid to such.

#### CHARGE FOR DRUGS TO OUT-PATIENTS.

Every care is taken not to render this oppressive, and all those who are too poor to pay are exempted.

The amounts received in the five years since the charge for medicine was first made are as follows :---

#### INSPECTOR OF CHARITIES' REPORT.

Mr A. S. Bond, the acting Inspector of Charities, visited the Institution on 12th, 13th and 18th March, 1897, and his Report which we deem eminently satisfactory, does not make any suggestions for the improvement of your Hospital.

The following are extracts from his Report to the Hon. the Treasurer of Victoria, viz:--

"The management of both the Hospital and Benevolent Asylum appears to be excellent, and the Institution and grounds well looked after, and in thorough order; the operating room is the best I have seen in the colony.

I went over the whole of the buildings and grounds, and was much pleased with the evident care and forethought shown for both patients and inmates, and consider that the Committee and Officers are to be congratulated upon the efficiency of their Institution."

#### NEW BUILDINGS.

Referring to new buildings erected in the last two years, viz:—The "Bowen" Memorial Operating <u>Room</u> and <u>Wards</u> in July, 1895; the Out-Patients' Department and Dispensary, April, 1896; and the "Harding" Nurses' Home in July, 1896, attention is called to the views of them which will be found at the end of this report.

These buildings were erected from designs by, and under the supervision of, Messrs Tombs and Durran, architects of Geelong, and are found admirably suited for the purposes for which they were constructed.

The Inspector of Charities for Victoria in his report on his last visit to the Hospital described the operating room as the best he had seen in the colony.

#### IMPROVEMENTS.

Some improvements have been made during the year under review.

The Nurses' Cubicle in No. 2 Ward was removed, and thereby gave accommodation for another bed.

Outside the same Ward a platform was constructed on to which the convalescing patients are wheeled into the fresh air. This makes their recovery much more rapid.

Through the whole of the building a  $1\frac{1}{3}$ -inch fire service has been laid on, and thus more adequate protection has been gained in the event of an outbreak of fire.

The lift from the laundry to the linen-room has been altered so that the laundresses may travel by it in addition to its carrying the clothes.

#### TRAINING SCHOOL FOR NURSES.

On July 15th, 1896, a new era was marked in the history of the Hospital by the starting of a training school for nurses and the opening of a home for their accommodation.

Your committee was prompted to take this step owing to the generous offer of the late Mrs Silas Harding to meet the cost of the necessary buildings. This amounted to  $\pounds 500$ , and was entirely defrayed by the deceased lady.

The first trainees admitted for three years' training were H. Arnold, V. Gullan, W. B. Norman, K. Anderson, N. Favarger, K. Mackenzie, and J. Robertson.

All these have up to the present time fully justified their selection, and bid fair to be a credit to your institution when their course of training is completed.

Although the training school is a source of expense to the funds of the Hospital, your committee is fully satisfied that the inauguration of it will be more than justified by the usefulness that it will ultimately achieve.

#### DEATH OF MRS SILAS HARDING.

In connection with the foregoing, your committee has most regretfully to record the death through a buggy accident in January, 1897, of Mrs Silas Harding, through whose liberality the "Harding" Nurses' Home was built. A marble tablet has been erected to her memory in the hall of the Institution.

#### INFECTIOUS WARD.

To mark the Diamond Jubilee of Her Gracious Majesty, Queen Victoria, a movement is on foot for the erection of an Infectious Ward in connection with your Hospital.

At the time of writing this, about £1000 has been received towards this project, but until it is known what sum will be eventually subscribed, it is impossible to say what buildings can or may be erected.

The community is, however, to be congratulated for having taken the matter up, as the one thing lacking in connection with your Hospital is proper accommodation for the isolation and treatment of Infectious Disease.

In the next Annual Report, we shall be able to lay before you full particulars as to the outcome of the present movement.

# REPORT OF MONTHLY VISITORS FOR THE YEAR.

JULY 9th, 1896.

A letter was read from Mr. Jas. Munday, one of the visitors appointed at the previous meeting, stating that he had visited the Institution. He had made a thorough inspection of the buildings and grounds, and found that everything was in satisfactory order. There had not been any complaints made by the patients and inmates.

#### AUGUST 18th, 1896.

The Rev. A. Davidson and Dr. Small, the visitors for the past month, reported that they had made a thorough inspection of the Hospital and Benevolent Asylum. They found that the excellent internal management was fully maintained. Several of the patients voluntarily expressed their gratitude for the kindness that they had been treated to by the medical and nursing staff and the officers. None of them had any complaints to offer. It was suggested that the old men's smoking shed might be rendered more comfortable by the erection of extra timber to afford shelter in summer and winter. The report was received.

#### SEPTEMBER 18th, 1896.

A favourable report was made by the Rev. J. P. McCann in regard to his visits to the Institution during the past month in conjunction with Mr. Chas. Shannon.

#### OCTOBER 15th, 1896.

The visitors' report for the past month was a written one from the Rev. A. W. Webb and Mr. J. H. Grey, stating that they had visited the Institution since the previous meeting, and found everything in perfect order and thoroughly clean. They recommended that better drainage should be provided from the servants' bath-room, and they thought that the Diphtheria Ward, No 12B., should be better ventilated. Dr. Small spoke strongly in favour of dividing the ward, with the view of providing for a Septic Ward which was urgently needed in connection with the Hospital. The ward at present was a waste of space and, at a small outlay of money, they could furnish the Institution with apartment for the treatment of septic diseases. Mr. Nicol stated that the House Committee had been considering the subject. With the expenditure of £100 they could provide for septic patients, and for the accommodation of at least 12 old women. The question was debated for a considerable time, and it was ultimately decided to refer the whole question to the House Committee for a report to the next meeting.

#### NOVEMBER 12th, 1896.

Messrs. E. L. Jullien and W. W. Bradley reported having visited and inspected the Institution since the previous meeting. They had found everything in thorough order, and no complaints were made, showing that all was satisfactory. They recommended that the two balconies should be painted. It was agreed to refer the recommendation to the House Committee.

#### DECEMBER 10th, 1896.

Mr. J. W. Sayer reported as to having visited the Institution during the month in company with Mr. W. H. Higgins, and found everything in a most satisfactory state; he had no recommendations to make.

#### JANUARY 14th, 1897.

A report was read from the Rev. Canon Goodman, which stated that, with Mr. H. B. Brown, he had visited the Institution. They had found the place in thorough order, cleanly, and there was general contentment in every part. The patients and immates were thoroughly well cared for, and there were no complaints. The pictures in one of the wards and the floral adcriments were very pleasant additions. Mr. Brown endorsed the Rev. gentleman's report.

#### FEBRUARY 11th, 1897.

Mr. Vines stated that, with Mr. Faulkner, he had twice visited the Institution during the past month. They had found everything correct and in satisfactory order, although they thought that the framework of the typhoid fever patients' wards should be painted. Mr. Faulkner endorsed the report.

#### MARCH 11th, 1897.

The Hon. J. H. Connor and Mr. Trait reported that they had visited the Institution and found everything in a satisfactory condition. They complained, however, of the insanitary state of the drain opposite the Hospital, and thought that the Town Council's attention should be called to it.

#### APRIL 15th, 1897.

Dr. Small reported that, in the absence of the Rev. J. P. McCann, he had paid a visit to the Institution, and found it in its usual admirable state.

#### MAY 13th, 1897.

The Rev. A. Davidson, one of the visitors for the past month, reported that in his opinion the office of visitor had become a sinecure. There was nothing to be done. All of the wards presented a bright, clean, and cheerful appearance, and the nurses evidently spared themselves no trouble to render the lot of those under their charge as comfortable and as home-like as possible. The patients, too, all bore testimony to the kind and considerate treatment which they received. The report was adopted.

JUNE 10th, 1897.

A report was read from the Rev. A. Webb and Mr. Chas. Shannon regarding their visit to the Institution since the previous committee meeting. They stated that everything had been found in very good order, and they urged that an effort should be made to secure an improvement in the drainage in the front of the Hospital. After discussion it was decided that the Town Council should be written to with a request for prompt action to be taken to improve the drainage in Ryrie Street in front of the Hospital building.

#### STAFF.

With the exception of the Resident Surgeon the Officers of the Institution remain the same. In February, 1897, Dr. Kennedy, who had held the position of Resident Surgeon since May, 1890, resigned the position to start private practice in Geelong, and Dr. Gavin McCallum, M.B., Ch.M., Glasgow, late of the Western Infirmary and Hospital for Sick Children, both in that city, was appointed in his place.

Since his appointment he has fully justified your Committee's selection.

#### HONORARY MEDICAL STAFF.

Dr. Hope resigned in February, 1897, to visit Europe, and Dr. Kennedy was appointed to the vacant position.

The other Honorary Medical Officers are Drs. Marwood, Newman and Small, with Dr. Croker as Consulting Surgeon.

Your thanks are due to these gentlemen for their attention to both In and Out-Patients during the year.

#### VOTES OF THANKS.

The Ladies' Flower Mission still continue to attend every week with flowers for the sick in the wards, and the thanks of the subscribers are hereby tendered to them for their labor of love; also to all those societies and individuals who have given or promoted Concerts or Entertainments for the amusement of the Patients and Inmates.

#### GENERAL COMMITTEE OF MANAGEMENT.

The Rev. J. P. McCann owing to his removal to Maryborough resigned in April, 1897, and Mr. J. J. Trait for business reasons in May, 1897. These vacancies with four others, making the statutory six, will have to be filled at the forthcoming annual meeting.

#### AUDITORSHIP.

Mr Wm. Hitchins has resigned his position as Auditor, and Mr A. J. Young has been temporarily appointed in his place.

#### COMMITTEES.

Grey, Esq., has not been absent from one meeting of the 13 held by the General Committee, and that Mr James Nicol, the Chairman of the House Committee has not only attended all these but has never failed to occupy the chair at each of the 51 meetings of his own Committee.

The thanks of the subscribers are due to these gentlemen and the other members of the Committee for the assiduous way in which they have looked after the interests of the Institution.





### EXTRACTS FROM BYE-LAWS.

#### OBJECTS.

82

Bye-Law No. 2.

That the objects of the Infirmary be to afford medical and surgical aid to poor persons requiring it; to a limited number of paying patients whose admission, under special circumstances, may be sanctioned by the Committee of Management; and for casualties; but no person who shall meet with casualties and shall be found able to pay for surgical aid shall receive further than temporary assistance. That the objects of the Benevolent Asylum be the reception of the poor and distressed, with a view to afford them consolation and assistance.

#### APPROPRIATION OF BUILDINGS.

Bye-Law No. 3.

That a portion of one of the buildings shall be set apart for the purpose of an Infirmary, and a portion for the purpose of the Benevolent Asylum, at the discretion of the Committee, who shall also be empowered to permit the reception of Lunatics on remand for medical examination in a ward erected for that purpose.

#### CONSTITUTION.

Bye-Law No. 4.

The Corporation shall consist of a President, two Vice-Presidents, Treasurer, Governors and Contributors.

#### QUALIFICATION, DESIGNATION AND PRIVILEGES OF BENEFACTORS.

#### Bye-Law No. 5.

The following shall be the qualification, designation, and privileges of Governors, Contributors, and Honorary Collectors, viz. :---

£50, personal contribution in one year—Life Governor. £20 ,, , , , , , Life Subscriber.

 320 "Life Subscriber.
 350 Bequest under will, first named or acting executor (bequest under will) under
 Governor for one year.

- £20 society, association, or company collecting or paying in one year (to nominate for each £20 collected or paid).
- £1 and upwards, Minister of Church or Honorary Layman collecting in one year. Collector.
- £1 and upwards, yearly subscription—Contributor.

Provided always that no minister, congregation, association, society, company, or person shall nominate as a contributor or contributors any person or persons, the yearly subscription or subscriptions for whom shall be sought or intended to be paid out of moneys derived from a public or private collection for Charitable purposes. Every firm or partnership subscribing may exercise their privileges through one of themselves to be nominated in writing by such firm, and the Trustees or Executors of every Estate subscribing may exercise their privileges through one of themselves to be nominated in writing by such Trustees or Executors, and every Public or Corporate Body subscribing may exercise their privileges through some person in their employ to be nominated in writing by such Public or Corporate Body. The power of voting by nominees at Annual or Special Meeting being limited to three votes for all they represent.

#### Bye-Law No. 6.

Life Governors will be entitled to recommend—

1 In and 4 Out-Patients (always on the books). Life Subscriber—

1 In and 2 Out-Patients annually.

Governor for 1 year-

10 In and 20 Out-Patients.

Contributor---

1 In and 2 Out-Patients annually for each £1 subscribed. Honorary Collector—

1 In and 2 Out-Patients annually for each  $\pounds$ 1 collected.

#### Bye-Law No. 7.

Recommendation shall be made by ticket, and shall be only used for the recommendation of persons unable to pay for medical attendance; the reception of such person shall be subject to the approval of the Committee of Management, and provided that the funds and the accommodation of the Institution admit of their reception. When recommendations. cannot be acceded to, a ticket in lieu of that used shall be returned to the Subscriber. Tickets will be issued by the Secretary to Subscribers at the time of payment of subscriptions. Subscribers shall also have the privilege at any time, on application to the Secretary, of exchanging Out-Patients for In-Patients; and vice versa, one In-Patient's ticket being equivalent to three Out-Patients'. Bye-Law No. 8.

Subscribers of £1 and upwards shall have full power to vote at all meetings from time of payment, and shall be deemed Annual Subscribers from date of payment.

#### Bye-Law No. 9.

At all Annual and Special Meetings of the Corporation, Life Governors shall have three votes; Life Subscribers and Annual Governors two votes; Annual Contributors of £5 5s. and upwards, three votes; £3 3s., two votes; '£1, one vote; Honorary Collectors for whole amount collected in one year, one vote.

#### GENERAL MEETINGS.

Bye-Law No. 12.

An Annual Meeting of the Contributors shall be held on the last Thursday in the month of July in every year for the following purposes :---

(1.) To receive the Report of the Committee of Management and Audited Statement of Receipts and Expenditure for the year to 30th June preceding.

(2.) For the election of President, Vice-Presidents, and Treasurer, Honorary Medical Staff, and Auditors for the ensuing year.

(3.) The election of Members of the Committee of Management to fill vacancies.

(4.) For the transaction of any business of which notice has been given, or that may arise at such meeting connected with the Institution.

Bye-Law No. 13.

If required by the Committee of Management or upon the requisition in writing of six members of the Committee, or of ten Contributors, the Secretary shall, without delay, convene a special meeting of the Contributors, the occasion of calling such meeting being stated in such requisition; and no business shall be transacted at such special meeting except that for which it shall have been summoned.

#### Bye-Law No. 14.

All meetings of Contributors shall be called by the Secretary by advertisement in one or more newspapers published in Geelong, for at least one week previous to such meeting.

#### Bye-Law No. 15.

At all meetings of Contributors, the President, or in his absence, one of the Vice-Presidents shall take the chair; but in their absence the meeting shall choose its own chairman, who shall have a casting vote only. Ten Contributors entitled to vote shall constitute a quorum at all meetings of Contributors, and as soon as a quorum be present the chair shall be taken; but if no quorum is present within half-an-hour of the time named, such meeting shall stand adjourned for the following week at the same day and hour.

#### Bye Law No. 17.

Every question submitted to a General Meeting, and all elections, shall be decided by a majority of votes of Governors and Contributors present entitled to vote, and shall be taken by a show of hands, unless a ballot shall have been previously demanded by any three persons entitled to vote, in which case the voting shall be by ballot, and for such purpose scrutineers shall be appointed before the ballot is taken: and such elections by ballot shall be held on such day and such place as the Committee shall have determined, and shall have notified by advertisement in one or more newspapers published in Geelong three clear days before the said general meeting; and at such ballot all Governors and Contributors who are entitled to and desire to vote, shall attend in their proper persons; and the poll shall be kept open from three o'clock p.m. to eight o'clock p.m., and the Committee shall make provision for the orderly conduct of such election, and for the proper counting of the votes, and the publication of the result.

ADMISSION OF PATIENTS INTO THE INFIRMARY. Bye-Law No. 58.

Accidents and such cases of decided emergency only as in the opinion of the Resident Surgeon connot be delayed may be received in the Infirmary at any time without ticket; and the admission of patients, in ordinary cases recommended 'by Subscribers' tickets, shall be daily (Sundays excepted) between the hours of nine and twelve o'clock in the forenoon, by the Secretary and the Honorary Medical Staff for the week, or in the absence of such staff, by the Secretary and Resident Surgeon; such admission to be temporary, and subject to the approval of the House Committee at its next meeting.

#### ADMISSION OF PAYING PATIENTS.

Bye-Law No. 59.

Paying patients may be admitted at the discretion of the House Committee, who shall fix the weekly rate to be charged to each patient, and in the event of an operation being necessary may fix a fee therefor, and may require the same to be paid in advance; and every person admitted on the ground of emergency to the benefits of the Institution, and able, in the estimation of the Committee, to pay, shall be required to do so at such rate as the Committee may determine. Each admission of a paying patient shall be reported to the General Committee at its next meeting, and shall be subject to confirmation. Bye LawNo. 60.

The General Rules and Regulations of the Institution shall be applicable to, and be observed by all paying patients.

#### PERSONS NOT ADMISSIBLE.

#### Bye-Law No. 61.

No pregnant female for the purpose of confinement; no insane person, except on remand for medical examination in the Lunacy Ward; no one having a contagious or infectious disease; no one subject to epilepsy; nor any one, who, in the opinion of the Honorary Medical Staff for the week, or the Resident Surgeon, might receive equal benefit as an outpatient, shall be admitted; and no child under five years of age shall be admitted, except in cases of accidents or for a surgical operation; nor except under special circumstances shall patients be admitted from other districts where Hospitals exist; provided that the House Committee or Officers of the Institution shall have discretionary power to admit such prohibited cases, and shall report upon the exercise of such power to the next general meeting of the Committee of Management.

#### ADMISSION OF INMATES INTO THE BENEVOLENT ASYLUM.

#### Bye-Law No. 62.

The admission of inmates into the Benevolent Asylum shall be restricted to those days in each week upon which the House Committee meets, when applications shall be considered and decided upon. No pregnant female for the purpose of confinement; no person insane; no child under twelve years of age; no one having a contagious or infectious disease, shall be admitted.

#### RULES FOR VISITORS.

1.—Visitors shall be admitted into the Institution on Sunday and Thursday in each week, between the hours of two and four in the afternoon, but no visitor shall be allowed to remain more than one hour. Not more than two visitors will be allowed to see any patient at the same time, except on special occasions, and by leave of the Resident Surgeon or Superintendent.

2.—Visitors may be admitted on special occasions, and by the Resident Surgeon or Superintendent, or by a written order from a member of the House Committee.

3.—Visitors shall not be allowed to enter any ward without the leave of the Resident Surgeon or Superintendent, and every visitor shall retire when requested.

4.—They shall not be permitted to give to or to leave with any patient any medicines, food or liquor of any kind without the express leave of the Resident Surgeon or Superintendent.

5.—No Visitor shall give to any servant of the Institution any money or gratuity of any kind. 6.-Visitors shall not interfere with the Wardsmen or Nurses, or disturb the patients by loud talking or unnecessary noise.

7.—No male visitor shall visit a female ward without the leave of the Resident Surgeon or Superintendent. and then shall not enter the ward without the Nurse in charge being first informed.

8.—Any visitor violating any of the Regulations of the Institution, or behaving with impropriety, shall be compelled to retire, and will not be re-admitted without special leave from the Resident Surgeon or Superintendent.

#### MINISTERS OF RELIGION, &c.

Any Minister of Religion or Religious Instructor shall have access to the patients of their respective denominations at all reasonable times when not objected to by such patients or the Medical Staff.

Ministers and others performing religious services at the bed side of any patient, shall do so in such a manner as to be as little overheard as possible by the surrounding patients.
