

Governors, Subscribers and the General Public,

LADIES AND GENTLEMEN,

Once more the time has arrived for your Committee to report the work and progress of the Institution, during the past financial year, which ended on the 30th June.

Your Committee feels that its duty is to faithfully report to you what has been done during the twelve months just closed, and while presenting to you a Balance Sheet showing what money has been received, and how expended; to take you further; so that you can see for yourselves the usefulness of the Institution, which depends on your generous support for its existence.

In the following pages, there will be found a full statement of all matters that is considered necessary to lay before you, and it is confidently hoped that the fullness of details will assure an increased amount of interest and support to be given to the Institution

Annual average cost per head, £31 6s. 3d.

The cost per head is higher than last year, owing to a lower daily average and the greatly increased cost of provisions, coal and firewood. A larger number of operations have been performed, which are always expensive, necessitating the purchase of a quantity of new instruments and dressings. It was also found necessary to greatly increase the stock of clothing and goods in Matron's store which had been allowed to get very low by previous Matrons.

Charge for Drugs to Out-Patients.

This is never allowed to press heavily on the poor, and all who are unable to pay the small charge made are exempted.

The Out-Patient Department is an expensive, but most useful part of the Hospital's operations, and is much appreciated by those who are unable to pay the ordinary medical fees. Regular and careful enquiry is made to ascertain that those seeking relief are entitled to charitable aid.

The numbers who have sought treatment and medicine are less than in former years, owing to the remarkably healthy state of Geelong.

This satisfactory condition is undoubtedly due to the increased cleanliness of the Town since the Bubonic plague scare.

Report of the Resident Surgeon.

The total number of In-patients treated in the Hospital, during the past twelve months, was 797, of whom 57 remain.

The death-rate has been 8.7%. 70 Patients having died, of whom 7 died within 24 hours of admission.

The number of Typhoid Fever Patients has been lower than usual, only 17 as against 60 in the previous year.

Inspector of Charities Report.

Mr. F. T. Short, Inspector of Charities, visited the Institution on 11th July. The following are extracts from his Report to the Hon. The Treasurer of Victoria:—

“As pointed out in former Reports, this Institution is very poorly supported by the Municipal Councils, the rate for daily average of Municipal Grant being only 16/9, as compared with the mean rate of £4 4s. 4d. This is one of the lowest rates of any Institution in the State. I would suggest that the Members of the Committee approach the public bodies, and bring the claims of the Institution prominently forward, so that a more beneficial result may accrue. I cannot but help thinking that if the matter was properly represented to the several Municipalities in the district, that the claims of the Institution to their support would be recognised.

“The cost per bed for daily average, was, I am pleased to see, a reduction on the previous year.

“The amount received as Patients Contributions is very creditable. The average stay for hospital cases during the year was 27 days, which is about the average for Country Institutions.”

Re Hospital Sunday.

The action of the Hospital Sunday Fund Committee in their disposition of the moneys collected last year, has provoked a good deal of controversy and has been strongly protested against by your Committee.

It may be stated at the outset, that your Committee entertains none but the kindest and most sympathetic feelings towards the other two charities which have hitherto participated in the annual distribution, and it is with no wish to injure them that the present stand has been taken.

But the fact remains that the public subscribe towards Hospital Sunday under the distinct impression, that as the name implies, they are giving towards the Hospital only, and the inclusion of the Ladies' Benevolent Association and the Homeopathic Dispensary, however it was accomplished was undoubtedly a mistake, and calculated to mislead. Why these were included, and the other charities of an equally deserving character omitted, is a mystery, but, the objections to their participation apply with just as much force, to the proposal which has been freely mooted, that all charities shall share in the distribution. The moment we get beyond a broad and comprehensive charity, like the Hospital, which appeals equally to "all sorts and conditions of men," it is impossible to obtain unanimity in deciding what institutions are worthy of inclusion, and thus enthusiasm and interest are lost to the great detriment of the movement.

Your Committee therefore, after due deliberation decided last year, that an appeal should be made to the bodies interested, to make the Hospital Sunday, one in reality as well as in name. They were, in a measure forced to take this step, in view of the continued encroachments of the two charities already participating, whose proportions were being increased from time to time at the expense of the Hospital's share.

Having made their appeal therefore to the Churches to send their contribution to the Hospital direct, and having received a favourable response from the large majority, your Committee and those who thought with them,

did not consider it necessary to attend the public meeting called for the formation of a Hospital Sunday Fund Committee, consequently that meeting was attended only by those determined to regard our attitude as hostile, and to uphold by every means in their power the present system of distribution. The result was, the election of a committee holding similar views, who instead of acting simply as a distributive body, dealing solely with the funds placed in its hand for the purpose, assumed the right to control the monies which had been sent to the Hospital direct, and pay the other two Institutions their proportions of such monies out of the funds which it held. A good deal of indignation was caused by this action, which was regarded as an interference with the right of those who sent direct, to divide their collections as they thought proper, and although it may be conceded that the fund committee, unless it had received a mandate from the Churches which sent their collections to it, was strictly within its rights in dividing the latter in such proportions as it chose.

Your committee cannot but regard the distribution as an improper one and have only accepted their share (which as reduced, means a loss to us of about £42) under protest. It is evident from its own action, as well as from the fact that a great majority of the Churches dispensed with its services, that the Hospital Sunday Fund Committee cannot uphold its claim to be considered a representative body.

Your Committee trusts that the Churches will recognise the force of their arguments in favor of keeping Hospital Sunday for the Hospital alone, and encouraged by the splendid response received last year, from the Churches direct, we believe the next year will be even more favorable, but, whether the Churches adopt this view, or determine to divide the collection with others, there is no necessity for the Committee referred to, as it will be little or no trouble to send their contributions direct, and thus ensure the wishes of the givers, who are alone entitled to a say in the matter, being carried into effect without delay or deduction.

Re Legacies, Bequests, etc.

It is the earnest wish of your Committee to start an Endowment Fund, the absence of which has been so severely felt during recent years. With this object your Committee especially desires to bring the need of such a Fund before those charitably disposed persons who have the means, and who may wish to perpetuate their memory by endowing a bed. This is done in many other Hospitals, and the name of the benefactor inscribed on a tablet in the ward. Up to the present your Committee regrets that there is not one endowed bed in the Institution.

Re Subscriber's Tickets.

Subscribers are respectfully asked to satisfy themselves when possible that applicants for tickets of admission are really entitled to charitable aid. In this way they can protect the Institution from being imposed upon, and keep it for those whom it is intended, *i.e.*, those who cannot pay for outside medical advice.

Collections in State Schools.

A Collection was again taken up during the year by the children of the town and district with very satisfactory results, the total sum amounting to £80 5s. 8d.

The head teachers and the children who so kindly gave up their time to this work are gratefully thanked for their zeal.

None of this money would find its way to the Hospital were it not for the children's aid, as it is made up of penny subscriptions.

A child can ask for a small donation with confidence, knowing there are very few who will refuse when asked to "please give a penny for the Hospital."

Old Age Pension

The advent of this scheme (came into force) during the year, which resulted in an exodus of the more abled-bodied inmates from the Benevolent Asylum. It is greatly to be feared that in many cases the recipients who left to obtain the Pension have not benefitted by the change.

Old people without friends, and with such a small amount to depend upon as the pension affords, require attention in many ways, both as regards medical attendance, food and cleanliness. This they do not, and cannot obtain outside.

Apart from this, it is undoubtedly a fact that some of the Pensioners are in the habit of spending their pension on drink, directly they get it, depending on what they can obtain by begging, for their food and clothing.

Gifts in Kind.

There are many people whose circumstances will not allow them to give contributions in money, but who might possibly afford a donation of fruit, vegetables, firewood, worn clothing, old linen, etc.

To these we would be grateful for any of the above, which are always acceptable.

Entertainments in Aid.

While thanking all who have so kindly assisted the Institution by organising entertainments, there is still room for many more efforts in this direction which could be turned to profitable account.

Proposed Typhoid and Diphtheria Ward.

There is a sum of £1432 promised and in hand towards this much needed addition to your Hospital. Lack of funds is the only hindrance to its erection

A new fence has been placed round the ground at a cost of £93.10s.

The ward will require over £2000 to build and furnish. Owing to the many calls made upon the public during the past year, your Committee has not thought the time propitious to make an appeal for the balance of the money required before a start can be made.

It is suggested that a combination of the Transvaal War Memorial Fund with the late Queen Victoria's Diamond Jubilee Ward Fund would be a lasting and very appropriate memorial of the two events.

Staff.

Dr. R. G. McPhee was re-appointed Senior Resident Surgeon on completion of his year's term of office.

Mr. A. E. S. Vernon, House Steward and Dispenser resigned in January. Dr. H. Catford, Junior Resident Surgeon also resigned about this time. Your Committee then decided to re-distribute the work, and appointed Dr. Major as Junior Resident Surgeon and Dispenser. The duties of the House Steward were combined with those of the Superintendent and Secretary. Mr. G. Silvester who had been in the Institution's service for some time, having always done his work with care and credit, was appointed Assistant House Steward. The arrangement has worked well and satisfactorily.

Sister Wilson resigned in December, 1900, and Nurse Robertson a former trainee of the Hospital was appointed charge sister in her place. Sister Robertson has justified her appointment to a very difficult and important position, by performing her duties to the entire satisfaction of the Officers and Committee.

Several of the nurses in the training school having obtained their certificates, left to undertake responsible positions in various hospitals.

It is to be noted with satisfaction that nurses trained in your Institution are sought after by other hospitals and spoken of very highly.

Visitors' Monthly Reports.

Every month two members of the Committee have in turn visited and closely scrutinised the inner working of the Institution, and with the exception of a few minor details, have always been able to report very favourably. Every patient or inmate has the opportunity given them of bringing any cause of complaint before the Committee; throughout the year no event of any importance was brought under the notice of the visitors.

Re Municipal Grants.

The Government Inspector especially drew attention in his last report to the Premier to the small amount contributed by the town and district Councils.

Your Committee has made strenuous efforts to obtain better support from the various public bodies by deputation, which your Committee is glad to say has borne fruit, as the Geelong Town Council increased its annual grant from £20 to £50, Geelong West from £10 to £20, and the Shire of Bannockburn from £3 to £5. Newtown and Chilwell have for some years given £20 annually.

Notwithstanding the satisfactory increases here recorded, there are still many Councils whose subscriptions are totally inadequate in view of the benefits they receive, when it is remembered that their residents are admitted by the Hospital, suffering with such diseases as typhoid and diphtheria.

It is to be sincerely hoped that they will now come into line with more generous help, for they cannot but recognise that the Hospital is doing good work for them in treating cases that they, the Councils, are distinctly responsible in providing for under the Local Government Act. This they would have to do, did the Hospital authorities strictly adhere to the rules governing the Institution; and in that case the various Councils referred to would find they had to pay hundreds of pounds where they now contribute annually sums varying from £2 to £10.

Honorary Medical Staff.

The Honorary Medical Staff consists of Drs. Newman, Marwood, Kennedy and McCallum, with Drs. Croker and Small as Honorary Consulting Surgeons. The first four now retire but are eligible for re-election.

On behalf of the Subscribers, the thanks of the Committee are tendered to these gentlemen for their kind attention to the patients during the year.

Renovating, &c.

During the year much work has been done in the way of renovating and repairs.

The Institution's carpenter and painter have been kept busily employed ; the following is a list of some of the wards that have been thoroughly rehabilitated, painted and cleaned throughout—

Ward No 9, including wardmen's rooms, fittings, pantry and porch. Ward 11B, with porch. Ward 12A, bath-room and porch. Ward No. 4, and fittings. Ward No. 3. Diphtheria Ward, small. Male and female lunacy cells, wards, wardsmen's room, bath-room, etc. Male Benevolents' dining room. Lodge and front fence renovated and painted. Notice board re-written. A lot of other work too varied to mention here has also been done.

Special Gifts.

Messrs. W. Humble & Sons are specially thanked for their generous supply of ice throughout the year free of charge, which apart from their annual donation represents a large sum. Messrs. Humble & Sons have also granted the gratuitous use of their cold storage rooms at various times, which has been a great boon.

The House Committee comprising Messrs. J. Nicol, W. Humble, E. L. Jullien, W. Gardiner and J. Munday are also gratefully thanked for donating £41 amongst themselves to make up the loss sustained by the Institution through the unusual allocation by the Hospital Sunday Fund Committee.

Votes of Thanks.

The thanks of the Committee and subscribers are hereby tendered to the Ladies' Flower Mission, for their unselfish and arduous labour in supplying cut flowers weekly throughout the year to each patient and inmate; to Mr. H. Bradley & Son for attending and regulating the clocks of the Institution; and to all those societies and individuals who have given or promoted Concerts or Entertainments in aid of the funds, or for the amusement of the patients and inmates; to the Press, the thanks of the Committee are also conveyed for the fair manner in which it has all times published the proceedings of the Committee, and advocated the requirements of the Institution financially; also, the proprietors of the following papers, viz:—Australasian, Argus, Age, Leader, Geelong Advertiser, Geelong Times, Ballarat Star, Ballarat Courier. and Advocate, for the gratuitous supply of their papers which are much appreciated.

Xmas. Dinner.

As usual the patients and inmates sat down to a sumptuous dinner and tea on Christmas Day. Nothing was absent that could cheer the heart or please the eye.

Geese, fowls, ducks and sucking pigs were provided by the generous donors of the feast, to whom the most grateful thanks of the Committee, inmates and patients are now tendered.

Messrs. G. Martin, J. Munday, J. H. Peebles and the Rev. A. Davidson very kindly gave up their time to solicit gifts and donations for this purpose; and it is with pleasure we state that all who were asked gave with an unstinted hand.

Had the donors seen the pleasure they gave to the partakers of their kindness, they would have been well repaid. A list of the givers is printed further on in the Report.

General Committee of Management.

Geo. Martin, Esq., J.P. was re-elected President by the subscribers at the last Annual Meeting, J. Nicol and C. Shannon, Esqs., Vice-Presidents and J. W. Sayer, Esq., Honorary Treasurer.

J. H. Peebles, Esq., was also elected to a seat on the Committee.

Final.

The members of your Committee who have been longest in office, and therefore retire under the provisions of the Act governing the Charities are—Revs. Canon Goodman and A. Davidson, Messrs. W. W. Bradley, W. Humble, J. Purdie and J. Munday. These gentlemen are all eligible for re-election.

Extracts from Bye-Laws.

OBJECTS.

Bye-Law No. 2.

That the objects of the Infirmary be to afford medical and surgical aid to poor persons requiring it; to a limited number of paying patients whose admission, under special circumstances, may be sanctioned by the Committee of Management; and for casualties; but no person who shall meet with casualties and shall be found able to pay for surgical aid shall receive further than temporary assistance. That the objects of the Benevolent Asylum be the reception of the poor and distressed, with a view to afford them consolation and assistance.

APPROPRIATION OF BUILDINGS.

Bye-Law No. 3.

That a portion of one of the buildings shall be set apart for the purpose of an Infirmary, and a portion for the purpose of the Benevolent Asylum, at the discretion of the Committee, who shall also be empowered to permit the reception of Lunatics on remand for medical examination in a ward erected for that purpose.

CONSTITUTION.

Bye-Law No. 4

The Corporation shall consist of a President, two Vice-Presidents, Treasurer, Governors, and Contributors.

QUALIFICATION, DESIGNATION AND PRIVILEGES OF BENEFACTORS.

Bye-Law No. 5.

The following shall be the qualification, designation, and privileges of Governors, Contributors and Honorary Collectors, viz :—

£50, personal contribution in one year—	Life Governor

£50 Bequest under will, first named or acting executor (bequest under will) under such will.	} Governor for one year

Provided always that no minister, congregation, association, society, company, or person shall nominate as a contributor or contributors any person or persons, the yearly subscription or subscriptions for whom shall be sought or intended to be paid out of moneys derived

from public or private collections for Charitable purposes. Every firm or partnership subscribing may exercise their privileges through one of themselves to be nominated in writing by such firm, and the Trustees or Executors of every Estate subscribing may exercise their privileges through one of themselves being nominated in writing by such Trustees or Executors, and every Public or Corporate body subscribing may exercise their privileges through some person in their employ to be nominated in writing by such Public or Corporate Body. The power of voting by nominees at Annual or Special Meeting being limited to three votes for all they represent.

Bye-Law No. 6.

Life Governors will be entitled to recommend—

1 In and 4 Out-Patients (always on the books).

Life Subscriber—

1 In and 2 Out-Patients annually.

Governor for 1 Year—

10 In and 20 Out-Patients.

Contributor—

1 In and 2 Out-Patients annually for each £1 subscribed.

Honorary Collector—

1 In and 2 Out-Patients annually for each £1 collected.

Bye-Law No. 7.

Recommendation shall be made by ticket and shall be only used for the recommendation of persons **unable** to pay for medical attendance; the reception of such persons shall be subject to the approval of the Committee of Management, and provided that the funds and the accommodation of the Institution admit of their reception. When recommendations cannot be acceded to, a ticket in lieu of that used shall be returned to the Subscriber. Tickets will be issued by the Secretary to Subscribers at the time of payment of subscriptions. Subscribers shall also have the privilege at any time, on application to the Secretary, of exchanging Out-Patients for In-Patients; and vice versa, one In-Patient's ticket being equivalent to three Out-Patients'

Bye-Law No. 8.

Subscribers of £1 and upwards shall have full power to vote at all meetings from time of payment, and shall be deemed Annual Subscribers from date of payment.

Bye-Law No. 9.

At all Annual and Special Meetings of the Corporation, Life Governors shall have three votes; Life Subscribers and Annual Governors, two votes; Annual Contributors of £5 5s. and upwards, three votes; £3 3s., two votes; £1, one vote; Honorary Collectors for whole amount collected in one year, one vote.

GENERAL MEETINGS.

Bye-Law No. 12.

An Annual Meeting of the Contributors shall be held on the last Thursday in the month of July in every year for the following purposes:—

- (1.) To receive the Report of the Committee of Management and Audited Statement of Receipts and Expenditure for the year to 30th June preceding.
- (2.) For the election of President, Vice-Presidents, and Treasurer, Honorary Medical Staff, and Auditors for the ensuing year.
- (3.) The election of Members of the Committee of Management to fill vacancies.
- (4.) For the transaction of any business of which notice has been given, or that may arise at such meeting connected with the Institution.

Bye-Law No. 13.

If required by the Committee of Management or upon the requisition in writing of six members of the Committee, or of ten Contributors, the Secretary shall, without delay, convene a special meeting of the Contributors, the occasion of calling such meeting being stated in such requisition; and no business shall be transacted at such special meeting except that for which it shall have been summoned.

Bye-Law No. 14.

All meetings of Contributors shall be called by the Secretary by advertisement in one or more newspapers published in Geelong, for at least one week previous to such meeting.

Bye-Law No. 15.

At all meetings of Contributors, the President, or in his absence, one of the Vice-Presidents shall take the chair; but in their absence the meeting shall choose its own chairman, who shall have a casting vote only.

Bye-Law No. 16.

Ten Contributors entitled to vote shall constitute a quorum at all meetings of Contributors, and as soon as a quorum be present the chair shall be taken: but if no quorum is present within half-an-hour of the time named such meeting shall stand adjourned for the following week at the same day and hour.

Bye-Law No. 17.

Every question submitted to a General Meeting, and all elections shall be decided by a majority of votes of Governors and Contributors present entitled to vote, and shall be taken by a show of hands, unless a ballot shall have been previously demanded by any three persons entitled to vote, in which case the voting shall be by ballot, and for such purpose scrutineers shall be appointed before the ballot is taken; and such election by ballot shall be held on such day and such place as the Committee shall have determined, and shall have notified by advertisement in one or more newspapers published in Geelong three clear days before the said general meeting; and at such ballot all Governors and Contributors who are entitled to and desire to vote shall attend in their proper persons; and the poll shall be kept open from three o'clock p.m. to eight o'clock p.m., and the Committee shall make provision for the orderly conduct of such election, and for the proper counting of the votes, and the publication of the result.

ADMISSION OF PATIENTS INTO THE INFIRMARY.**Bye-Law No. 58.**

Accidents and such cases of decided emergency only as in the opinion of the Resident Surgeon cannot be delayed may be received in the Infirmary at any time without ticket, provided, however, that should an accident or emergency case remain in the Institution three days or more an In-Patients Ticket must then be procured without delay. The admission of patients, in ordinary cases recommended by Subscriber's tickets shall be daily, (Sundays excepted) between the hours of nine and twelve o'clock in the forenoon, by the Secretary and the Honorary Medical Staff for the week, or in the absence of such staff, by the Secretary and Resident Surgeon; such admission to be temporary, and subject to the approval of the House Committee, at its next meeting.

ADMISSION OF PAYING PATIENTS.**Bye-Law No. 59.**

Paying patients may be admitted at the discretion of the House Committee, who shall fix the weekly rate to be charged to each patient, and in the event of an operation being necessary may fix a fee therefore, and may require the same to be paid in advance; and every person admitted on the ground of emergency to the benefits of the Institution, and able, in the estimation of the Committee, to pay, shall be required to do so at such rate as the Committee may determine. Each admission of a paying patient shall be reported to the General Committee at its next meeting, and shall be subject to confirmation.

Bye-Law No. 60.

The General Rules and Regulations of the Institution shall be applicable to, and be observed by all paying patients.

PERSONS NOT ADMISSIBLE.

Bye-Law No. 61.

No pregnant female for the purpose of confinement; no insane person, except on remand for medical examination in the Lunacy Ward, no one having a contagious or infectious disease; no one subject to epilepsy; nor any one who, in the opinion of the Honorary Medical Staff for the week, or the Resident Surgeon, might receive equal benefit as an Out-Patient, shall be admitted; and no child under five years of age shall be admitted, except in cases of accidents or for a surgical operation; nor except under special circumstances shall patients be admitted from other districts where Hospitals exist; provided that the House Committee or Officers of the Institution shall have discretionary power to admit such prohibited cases, and shall report upon the exercise of such power to the next general meeting of the Committee of Management.

ADMISSION OF INMATES INTO THE BENEVOLENT ASYLUM.

Bye-Law No. 62.

The admission of inmates into the Benevolent Asylum shall be restricted to those days in each week upon which the House Committee meets, when applications shall be considered and decided upon. No pregnant female for the purpose of confinement; no person insane; no child under twelve years of age; no one having a contagious or infectious disease, shall be admitted.

PAYMENT OF MAINTENANCE.

All patients will be expected to pay towards the actual expenses of their maintenance, so far as their circumstances may enable them; and all property found on patients who may die in the Hospital will be appropriated to defray the expenses of the maintenance and burial. The residue, if any, to be handed over to their legal representatives.

The Committee of Management shall appoint a sub-committee (with the concurrence of the Surgeon) which shall have power to discharge any patient in case of his refusal to pay; and shall have the further power to require (if necessary) patients to make a declaration before a Justice as to their means.
