FIFTY-EIGHTH ANNUAL REPORT of the Committee of Management.

THE Committee of Management have the honor to submit to the Governors and Subscribers of the Institution their Report and Balance Sheets for the year ended 30th June, 1910.

They much regret that the Maintenance Balance Sheet does not show the satisfactory state of the Institution's finance which has obtained for some years past, as the year which started with a Credit Balance of £511 19s. 7d., has closed with a Credit Balance of £496 9s. 6d., while outstanding accounts amounting to £750 will be presented for payment during July. The high cost of provisions has affected the Hospital very materially. In addition to this, the number of patients treated has been considerably greater than for many years past. For weeks the occupied beds in the Hospital alone averaged about 93. To cope with these numbers, increased nurses had to be taken on the Staff. The building being so scattered, having been erected piece by piece without any definite plan, makes it much more difficult and expensive to work than would be the case with a new and up-to-date Hospital.

Typhoid Fever and Diphtheria have been fairly prevalent, 68 of the former and 95 of the latter having been admitted; also 3 Scarlet Fever.

The total number of patients passing through the Institution was 2,311. Of these 1,170 were admitted to the wards.

Out-Door Patients.—Number admitted: Males, 578; Females, 563; Total, 1,141. Number of occasions on which they attended, 6,411.

The average Rate of Mortality has been 7.7 for all cases: 7.3 for Hospital In-Door Patients. Nine deaths occurred within twenty-four hours of admission. These were hopeless from the first. The total number remaining in the Institution on the 30th June, was 140.

Infections Wards.—These have never been empty during the year. Ninety-five cases of Diphtheria, 68 cases of Typhoid Fever, and 3 cases of Scarlet Fever were admitted. Of these patients Geelong sent 86; South Barwon, 13; West Geelong, 24; Newtown & Chilwell, 29.

The Nurses' Home has been considerably enlarged, at a cost of some £700. It will cost fully another £150 to properly furnish. The additions were urgently required, and will hardly now accommodate all the Nurses it has been found necessary to employ.

An effort will shortly be made to liquidate the debt on this building, by making an appeal to the charitable. In the meantime your Committee will be very grateful to anyone who, thinking the object worthy, will help financially. The incoming Committee will, no doubt, inaugurate a scheme which, we hope, will bring in the necessary funds to extinguish this large liability.

The Amount to Credit of Endowment Fund is £7,685 3s. 6d.; and of the Reserve Fund, £4,250 2s. 8d.

The Government Grant was £2,400, being £100 less than for the previous year.

Visitors' Monthly Report.—Members of the General Committee have continued to make their monthly inspection, and report throughout the year. Their reports were always of a favorable nature.

Town and Shire Councils and Infectious Cases.—Your Committee has met in conference some of the most important Councils, and arranged with them on the question of their paying £2 per week for each of the cases coming from their boundaries; by accepting a lump sum to be renewed annually by both parties.

Although your Committee cannot report that they have been able to obtain very advantageous terms, yet, in view of the desirability of maintaining a good understanding between the Councils and your Institution, they have leaned somewhat perhaps on the side of leniency to the municipal bodies rather than exact the full amount they might be entitled to in each case.

In some infectious cases your Hospital is hardly dealt with, i.e., those that come from districts with which your Committee have no agreement. If treated in the Infectious Wards, the Government will not allow these patients to be counted as occupied beds towards claiming the Government Grant. When these distant Councils are asked to pay the cost of their treatment, they absolutely refuse to do so. Your Hospital has therefore to treat this class of patient without any recompense either from the Government or the Municipality. The Institution can, of course, refuse to admit in these circumstances, but it throws a great responsibility upon the official doing so, especially if patients have come from a distance. This, however, appears to be the only alternative, as, now that the fact is getting more known that Infectious Wards are open in connection with this Hospital, patients sometimes come from long distances with no claim whatever upon this district. The Infectious Wards have been kept busy and occupied during the whole year. They have entailed a permanent increase to the Staff of at least 4 Nurses, with occasional employment of supernumeraries.

Owing to the numbers seeking admission in the female medical and surgical wards, it was found necessary to open Ward (4). This has necessitated the appointment of another permanent sister, with 4 extra nurses, and leaves the Hospital without a spare ward in which to move patients while their own is being cleaned and fumigated.

Operating Theatre.—A pressing want in this Department is an up-to-date Steam Sterilizer, for sterilizing dressings, instruments, etc., in a quicker and more economical way than is at present possible. The cost, some £60, is the only obstacle to its being procured. Would some kind friend or friends who have the means come to our aid with the necessary funds? In the operating theatre 267 operations have been performed, which is 40 more than last year. The greater proportion of them were major operations.

Children's Ward.—A proposal was recently made that a collection be taken up in commemoration of King Edward the VII.'s reign, and used to build a Children's Ward at the Hospital. Your Committee, while always anxious to move forward, could not advise that it would be wise to add yet another building to the many which already exist, preferring rather to put the scheme off until the time shall arrive when the whole question of re-erecting the Hospital will be dealt with. The present building is old, and in an unsatisfactory state of repair, and at no distant date the question will have to be faced. It must not, however, be imagined that because the building is somewhat obsolete, that the results of the treatment are not satisfactory, as these will compare favorably with any other Hospital in the Commonwealth, however recent and up-to-date! The cost of such an undertaking is the main thing that stands in the way. To rebuild a Hospital of suitable size and requirements would cost many thousands of pounds. Is the District prepared to pay? That is the question. There can be no doubt that the Government will not do much; as witness the Melbourne Hospitals.

The daily average has been 66 Hospital and 78 Benevolent Asylum occupied beds, which is considerably more than last year. The increase has occurred wholly on the Hospital side. The average cost per bed was £40, which is £1 10s. more than last year, and is accounted for partly by the high prices ruling for eggs, butter, milk, etc.; the larger number of infectious cases treated, which also caused an increase of staff; and also to the fact that the daily average of beds occupied in the Hospital was 10 more than for the previous year, equalling 3,650 more days. These, with a fairly large amount of painting, have caused the increase in expenditure on maintenance.

Since the last Annual Meeting the subscribers have sanctioned the issue of Two Out-Patients' Tickets annually to contributors of 10/- or upwards. Up to the present, we regret to say, there has not been any marked increase of the 10/- subscribers from the smaller contributors.

Hospital Saturday and Sunday.—£418 was collected, which is an increase of £52 more than for the previous year. £22 of this is accounted for by the increased collections obtained by the Hospital Nurses in the streets. They worked with commendable zeal and energy, and obtained the record

of £55 5s. Misses Adams, Griffiths, Graham, S. Massey, Master W. Clarke, Trades' and Labour Council, and Members of Salvation Army also assisted. To the Nurses and these Honorary Collectors your Committee's thanks are hereby conveyed. Messrs. Dalgety & Co. (through Mr. D. Aitken Hendy, Leary & Co., J. C. King and J. C. Brown most generously lent their Motor Cars with chauffeurs for the day. They are hereby gratefully thanked.

Entertainments in Aid.—The small sum of £31 1s. 9d. was received. It is to be regretted that more interest is not taken by the public in this direction. An effort was made by the Geelong Operatic Society, and an excellent entertainment organized. The expenses of production, we are informed, were, however, greater than the receipts, and your Institution received no benefit. To all in any way assisted, sincere thanks are now conveyed.

Mrs. A. Rawson some time ago gave £1 15s. 9d. to start a Fund to purchase a New Piano for the use of the Benevolents' Dining Room, our present one being in a deplorable state of old age and decay. She is gratefully thanked for her help. It is hoped that ere long some other kind friends will take the matter up. A good second-hand instrument is all that is required.

Nurses' Training School.—The following changes have taken place in the personnel of the Nursing Staff. Nurses Mockridge and Ruby Parry, who finished their training in 1908, were promoted to positions of Sisters. Nurse Parry subsequently resigned, after having charge of male medical wards for 9 months. Training Nurses Kelly, Reeves, Fairbairn, Brown, Bourke, Tapp, Peddle, Giffen, McNaughton and Nicholls passed their examination in Anatomy and Physiology. Sister Tapp left us to go to the Women's to gain her certificate. Sister E. Johnston came back to us in February to take charge of Wards 2 and 3. The new Trainees taken on the Staff were the following:—Misses Campbell, Moyle, McIntosh and Gilliland. Nurses Seward, Fairbairn and Tapp contracted diphtheria while nursing patients, and Probationer Clements is at present ill with typhoid fever. Nurses Buchan and Reeve were both away on sick leave for periods extending over three months. Nurses Buchan and Davies were successful in passing their final examinations in Melbourne recently.

Life Subscribers and Governors.—Mr. S. McKay, Autumn Street, West Geelong, elected Governor for 5 years, May, 1910; Mr. J. Baker, Prince of Wales Hotel, Geelong, Governor for 7 years, November 13th, 1909; Mr. F. L. Hooper, Geelong, Life Subscriber, February, 1910; Mr. E. C. Coleman, February, 1910.

Staff.—Dr. Downing resigned in December. Your Committee much regretted losing his services. He was a very energetic and hard working Officer. Dr. A. W. Morgan was elected in his place. In February, owing to the increased work, it was decided to employ the services of another Medical Officer, and Dr. A. McKay was engaged for a period not to exceed 6 months. Miss J. Davidson, Matron, resigned in January, and Miss M. Harkness was appointed in her place. In April, Mr. Molloy, Dispenser, resigned, and Mr. W. Simpson was selected to fill the vacancy. No other important changes have occurred.

Medical Staff.—Drs. A. W. Marwood, F. J. Newman, T. J. M. Kennedy and G. McCallum were re-elected by the Subscribers at last elections; with Drs. R. G. McPhee and H. F. Elvins as Honorary Anaesthetist and Honorary Skiagraphist respectively. The latter gentlemen also take Out-Patients four days in each week. Drs. J. Small and P. A. Croker continue to act as Honorary Consulting Officers. Sincere thanks are tendered to these gentlemen for their valuable services. With the exception of Drs. Small and Croker, they now retire, but are willing to be re-elected, and offer themselves accordingly.

Dr. Marwood recently gave a Dance to the Nursing Staff and their friends in the large Benevolent Dining Room. All present thoroughly enjoyed themselves, and he was sincerely thanked for his kindness. A capital supper was also provided by the Doctor. For upwards of twenty years Dr. Marwood has given up his Christmas Day to carve the Dinner for Patients and Inmates, and provide them with amusement in afternoon and evening. His unselfish help and kindness is much appreciated.

Gifts.—Your Committee's grateful thanks are conveyed to the following kind donors :—Messrs. W. Humble & Sons, supply of ice all through the year, and use of Cool Store at Christmas. It should be mentioned that Messrs. Humble have given us an unlimited supply of ice for the last ten or eleven years. Queenscliff Fishing Company and Fishermen, numerous baskets of fish; Department of Agriculture, fish; Ladies' Flower Mission, for supplying weekly throughout the year cut flowers; to the Press for its valuable aid freely given; to the Members of the St. George's Guild Girls' Friendly Society and the Women's Protectionist Association, for ministering to the Benevolent Inmates and providing them with a Special Tea; to the Proprietors of the "Australasian," "Argus," "Age," "Leader," "Weekly Times," "Geelong Advertiser," "Geelong Times," "Ballarat Star," "Southern Cross," "Advocate" and "Worker," for supplying their respective papers.

Thanks are hereby tendered to Mrs. Bromley, for obtaining servants and wardmaids through the year free of charge. Mrs. Bromley has done this for many years past, and her kindness is much appreciated. To the many unselfish workers who have in any way assisted, and to the large number of liberal donors, your Committee desire to express their grateful thanks.

Christmas Dinner.—Messrs. G. Martin, F. J. Leary, T. A. Dickson, W. C. Kernot and W. W. Bradley volunteered as Collectors for Donations to the Christmas Dinner, which they very successfully carried out. As a result, a very ample and varied repast was set before all who were able to partake of it. The good things disappeared with remarkable celerity once the diners started. Cigars, and a liberal supply of tobacco and ale, the gift of generous townsmen, were much appreciated. All who contributed are heartily thanked.

It is with great regret that we have to record the death of Miss Hitchcock, who weekly for many years visited the Institution, being one of the most active workers of the Ladies' Flower Mission.

Board of Management.—Geo. Martin, Esq., J.P., was re-elected President at the last Annual Meeting; C. Shannon, Esq., and J. Nicol, Esq., Vice-Presidents; J. Smith, Esq., Hon. Treasurer; Messrs. H. B. Brown, G. E. England, E. L. Jullien, W. C. Kernot, T. A. Dickson, and the Rev. F. J. Newton were re-elected as Members of the General Committee. The following gentlemen go out now by effluxion of time, according to the Rules, having been longest in office :—Messrs. F. J. Leary, J. P. McCabe Doyle, E. L. Philpott, A. Collier, Rev. A. Powell, and Mr. C. Shannon, who voluntarily retires from the position of Vice-President. They are all eligible for re-election, and offer themselves accordingly.

During the year 12 Meetings of the General Committee; 50 of the House Committee; 12 of the Finance Committee; and 3 Special Meetings have been held.

Your Committee, before closing, would respectfully impress upon those who have the means and are blessed with good health, that in assisting an Institution such as the Geelong Infirmary they are combating the spread of disease, possibly saving either themselves or their relatives from incurring the infection, besides saving many valuable lives from the early death that otherwise would overtake them. The calls upon the resources of the Hospital especially are advancing rapidly year by year. There are Infectious Cases, Medical and Surgical, Maternity Cases, and the Benevolent Asylum to be provided for. In no city of a similar size in Victoria are these charitable objects achieved at so small a cost to the district. It is therefore hoped that even more generous help will be forthcoming in the future than in the past to carry on the good work of this Charity.



Extracts from Bye-Laws.

Qualification, Designation, and Privileges of Benefactors.—Bye-Law No. 5.—The following shall be the qualification, designation, and privileges of Governors, Contributors, and Honorary Collectors, viz.:—£50 personal contribution in one year—Life Governor; £30 personal contribution in one year—Governor for 5 years, with privileges during that period of a Life Governor; £20 personal contribution in one year—Life Subscriber; £50 bequest under will, first-named or acting executor (bequest under will) under such will—Governor for 5 years, to be entitled to 4 In and 8 Out Patients annually; £25 bequest under will, first-named or acting executor under such will—Governor for 2 years, to be entitled to 2 In and 4 Out Patients' tickets annually; £20 Society, Association or Company collecting and paying in one year (to nominate for each £20 collected or paid)—Life Subscriber; £1 and upwards Minister of Church or Layman collecting in one year—Honorary Collector; £1 and upwards, yearly subscription—Contributor.

Provided always that no Minister, Congregation, Association, Society, Company, or person shall nominate as a contributor or contributors any person or persons, the yearly subscription or subscription for whom shall be sought or intended to be paid out of moneys derived from public or private collection for Charitable purposes. Every firm or partnership subscribing may exercise their privileges through one of themselves, to be nominated in writing by such firm, and the Trustees or Executors of every Estate subscribing may exercise their privileges through one of themselves being nominated in writing by such Trustees or Executors, and every public or corporate body subscribing may exercise their privileges through some person in their employ to be nominated in writing by such Public or Corporate Body. The power of voting by nominees at Annual or Special Meeting being limited to three votes for all the represent.

Bye-Law No. 6.—Life Governors will be entitled to recommend 1 In and 4 Out-Patients (always on the books) ; Governor for 5 years (personal donation)—1 In and 4 Out Patients always on the books during that time ; Governor for 5 years (Executor under will)—4 In and 8 Out-Patients' tickets annually ; Governor for 2 years—2 In and 4 Out Patients' Tickets annually ; Life Subscriber—1 In and 2 Out-Patients' tickets annually ; Contributor—1 In and 2 Out Patients' tickets annually for each £1 subscribed ; Honorary Collector—1 In and 2 Out-Patients' tickets annually for each £1 collected.

Bye-Law No. 7.—Recommendation shall be made by ticket and shall only be used for the recommendation of persons UNABLE to pay for medical attendance ; the reception of such person shall be subject to the approval of the Committee of Management, and provided that the funds and the accommodation of the Institution admit of their reception. When recommendations cannot be acceded to, a ticket in lieu of that used shall be returned to the Subscriber. Tickets will be issued by the Secretary to the Subscribers at the time of payment of subscriptions. Subscribers shall also have the privilege at any time on application to the Secretary, of exchanging Out-Patients for In-Patients ; and "vice-versa" : One In-Patient's ticket being equivalent to three Out-Patients'.

Bye-Law No. 8.—Subscribers of £1 and upwards shall have full power to vote at all meetings from time of payment, and shall be deemed Annual Subscribers from date of payment.

Bye-Law No. 9.—At all Annual and Special Meetings of the Corporation, Life Governors shall have three votes ; Life Subscribers and Annual Governors, two votes ; Annual Contributors of £5 5/- and upwards, three votes ; £3 3/-, two votes ; £1, one vote ; Honorary Collectors, for whole amount collected in one year, one vote.

Admission of Patients into the Infirmary.—Bye-Law No. 58.—Accidents and such cases of decided emergency only as in the opinion of the Resident Surgeon cannot be delayed may be received in the Infirmary at any time without ticket, provided however, that should an accident or emergency case remain in the Institution three days or more, an In-Patient's Ticket must then be procured without delay. The admission of patients in ordinary cases recommended by Subscribers' Tickets shall be daily (Sundays excepted) between the hours of nine and twelve o'clock in the forenoon, by the Secretary, and the Honorary Medical Staff for the week, or in the absence of such staff, by the Secretary and Resident Surgeon ; such admission to be temporary, and subject to the approval of the House Committee at its next meeting.

Admission of Paying Patients.—Bye-Law No. 59.—Paying Patients may be admitted at the discretion of the House Committee, who shall fix the weekly rate to be charged to each patient, and in the event of an operation being necessary may fix a fee therefor, and may require the same to be paid in advance ; and every person admitted on the ground of emergency to the benefits of the Institution, and able, in the estimation of the Committee, to pay, shall be required to do so at such rate as the Committee may determine. Each admission of a Paying Patient shall be reported to the General Committee at its next meeting, and shall be subject to confirmation.

Bye-Law No. 60.—The General Rules and Regulations of the Institution shall be applicable to and be observed by all Paying Patients.

Persons not Admissible—Bye-Law No. 61.—No insane person, except on remand for medical examination in the Lunacy Ward ; no one having a contagious or infectious disease ; no one subject to epilepsy ; nor anyone who, in the opinion of the Honorary Medical Staff for the week, or the Resident Surgeon, might receive equal benefit as an Out-Patient, shall be admitted ; and no child under five years of age shall be admitted, except in cases of accident or for a surgical operation ; nor except under special circumstances shall Patients be admitted from other districts where hospitals exist ; provided that the House Committee or Officers of the Institution shall have discretionary power to admit such prohibited cases, and shall report upon the exercise of such power to the next general meeting of the Committee of Management.

Admission of Inmates into the Benevolent Asylum—Bye-Law No. 62.—The admission of Inmates into the Benevolent Asylum shall be restricted to those days in each week upon which the House Committee meets ; when applications shall be considered and decided upon. No pregnant female for the purpose of confinement ; no person insane ; no child under twelve years of age ; no one having a contagious or infectious disease shall be admitted.

Payment of Maintenance—All Patients will be expected to pay towards the actual expenses of their maintenance, so far as their circumstances may enable them ; and all property found on Patients who may die in the Hospital will be appropriated to defray the expenses of the maintenance and burial. The residue, if any, to be handed over to their legal representatives.

The Committee of Management shall appoint a Sub-Committee (with the concurrence of the Surgeon) which shall have power to discharge any Patient in case of his refusal to pay ; and shall have the further power to require (if necessary) Patients to make a declaration before a Justice as to their means.
